ASKS ASSIGNEE TO SUE

**BOURBON FISCAL COURT TAKES
ACTION TO RECOVER THE
RECOVER AMOUNT LOST
IN BANK CRASH.**

**GRANT ASSIGNEE REASONABLE
TIME TO ACT UPON REQUEST.**

**ATTORNEY BATTERTON INTRO-
DUCES RESOLUTION WHICH
PASSES FISCAL BODY.**

With a view of recovering the value of stock held in the Citizens' Bank of Paris, which collapsed about two years ago, the Bourbon Fiscal Court, at its regular meeting yesterday passed a resolution requesting Buckner Woodford, Sr., assignee of the defunct institution, to bring suit against the President, directors and officers. The resolution was introduced to the court by County Attorney George Batterton on behalf of the court and the fund which is intended to educate the worthy young men of Bourbon county. The court as trustee of the Fund, held shares in the Citizens' Bank to the number of nineteen, the par value of which was \$100 per share. The stock, however, had advanced rapidly. The resolution indicates that the winding up of the affairs of the institution would result in the stockholders receiving little or nothing of the capital of the institution, and charge that the financial affairs had been neglected. John J. Redmon and R. H. Burris were appointed a committee to deliver to Buckner Woodford, Sr., a copy of the resolution, which is as follows:

"Whereas, the Bourbon Fiscal Court is Trustee under the will of William Garth, and whereas, said Fiscal Court as such Trustee, had and owned several shares of stock in the Citizens' Bank of Paris, Ky., and whereas by a certain deed of trust said bank made an assignment to Buckner Woodford, Sr., of Paris, Ky., for the benefit of its creditors, and whereas but little, if anything will be received by its stockholders, and whereas said Court as Trustee under said will, believe that the President, directors and officers of said Citizens' Bank were negligent in the management of the finances of said bank, and whereas said assignee has failed to institute any suit against said officers of the Citizens Bank.

Now therefore as trustees under said will and as stockholders in said bank this court hereby requests Buckner Woodford, Sr., assignee of the Citizens Bank, of Paris, Ky., to institute action against the President, Directors and any other officers and persons, negligent in the management of the business affairs of said bank, to recover from them the amount due, or in other words, the value of said stock owned by this court as Trustee under the will of William Garth.

It is further ordered that John J. Redmon and Roger Burris be and are hereby appointed a committee to deliver to Buckner Woodford, Sr., assignee of the Citizens Bank of Paris, Ky., a copy of these resolutions and order and this committee is further ordered to request that this suit be instituted within a reasonable time, from the time this request is made known and to report to the court what steps, if any, have been taken by said assignee at the October meeting of this court.

Squire L. J. Fretwell presided at the meeting yesterday in the absence of Judge Denis Dundon with the following magistrates present: E. P. Thomason, R. H. Burris, John J. Redmon, B. F. Stipp, O. B. Lloyd, John N. Shropshire. The report of Road Supervisor C. F. Redmon for the month of August, was received and ordered made of record and claims for work on the turnpikes of the county in the sum of \$2,809.50 were ordered paid and accounts to the amount of \$333.24 were allowed. Ordered that S. E. Bedford, County Treasurer, borrow the sum of \$5,000 for the use of the turnpike fund and execute note for same payable Jan. 1, 1914, and bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent from date.

Miss Vella Mastin having decided not to accept the \$25 allowed her under the Hamilton Fund it is ordered that the same be now paid as follows: To Elvira Smith, \$15; to Jessie M. Fee \$10.

Ordered that the sum of \$2,500 be appropriated for the use of the Road Supervisor for repairs.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Hamilton Fund pay to Miss Jennie Howard, the sum of \$50 out of said fund for services rendered.

Ordered that the further sum of \$100 be appropriated to build the Roseberry turnpike.
