COUNCIL ELECTS NEW OFFICIALS.

Two Members of Old Police
Force Dropped by Board
at First Meeting.

SALARIES ARE FIXED.

Wade H. Whitley Elected as
City Attorney to Succeed
Chas. A. McMillan.

Officers to serve the city for the ensuing two years were elected at the meeting of the new City Council held last night. The seven members of the board who received the oath of office on December 1, were present, and the slate prepared at the caucus held a few days ago went through without difficulty.

Two members of the police department since the present administration assumed the affairs of the city, were dropped from the roster, they being Patrolman Chas. Thomas and G. W. McKenney, George W. Judy and J. W. King being chosen in their stead and William Collins, who has served as City Electrician, was defeated by Howard Lancaster, a former incumbent. Earl McCracken was elected to the position held by King, who will become a member of the police force.

Upon the convening of Council, the usual number of accounts were allowed, a few building permits were granted, which was followed by the fixing of the salaries of the city officials. Councilman W. O. Hinton recommended that the salaries be fixed as follows, and the motion carried by a vote of 6 to 1: Mayor, \$100 per month; Councilmen, \$3 each meeting; City Attorney, \$500 per annum; City Clerk, \$50 per month; Chief of Police, \$100 per month; Patrolmen, \$75 per month each; Superintendent of Streets, \$85 per month; City Electrician, \$90 per month, two firemen, \$75 per month; Inspector of Weights and Measures, \$30 per month; City Attorney, \$500 per annum; City Collector, \$300 per annum; City Assessor, \$400 per annum.

After fixing the salaries the election of officers was proceeded with. Council Hinton moved the nomination of J. W. Hayden as City Clerk, who was unanimously elected. For City Attorney Councilman Hinton placed in nomination Wade H. Whitley, while Councilman Brooks nominated John J. Williams. The vote resulted four to two in favor of Mr. Whitley.

Attorney P. A. Thompson, who has been prominently mentioned as the successor to City Attorney C. A. McMillan, yesterday withdrew from the race in favor of Mr. Whitley, and although his name was not presented for a vote he received the complimentary vote of Councilman Kenney. For the members of the police force Councilman Hinton placed in nomination George W. Judy, while Councilman Kenney presented the name of G. N. McKenney, the former being elected by a vote of 5 to 2. James Moreland, who was nominated by Councilman Speakes was unopposed and received the entire vote of the Council, as did J. C. Elgin, who was nominated by Speakes. J. W. King was nominated by Mr. Hinton and Charles Thomas was presented by the opposing forces, King winning by five to two.

John Cain, who for the past four years has served the city in the capacity of Street Superintendent, in an efficient manner, was placed in nomination and received the entire vote of the Council.

Howard Lancaster, for City Electrician was elected over William Collins by a vote of five to two, and Chas. Barnett as a member of the fire department, was elected without opposition. Earl McCracken was elected as fireman over Webster Harp by a vote of four to three. Other officials elected without opposition were: Inspector of Weights and Measures, M. F. Kenney; City Treasurer and Collector, C. K. Thomas; City Assessor, L. D. Harris; Health Board, F. P. Campbell, C. J. Clarke and Monroe Mansfield.

INFERIOR GRADES OFFERED ON THE PARIS MARKET

One of the best sales of the season was held Tuesday when 41,855 pounds were sold for a total of \$5,524.98, or an average of \$13.22 per hundred. grade. Following are a few of the average. Following are a few of the averages:

Brennan & Kissick, of near Kenney Station, sold 14,280 pounds of tobacco for a total of \$2,182.44, or an average of \$14.93.

D. C. Lisle & Ross, of near Centerville, sold 7,035 pounds for a total of \$936.69, or an average of \$13.34 per hundred pounds.

Cleveland & Gray, of near Paris, sold 5,525 pounds of tobacco for a total of \$770.77, or an average of \$13.92 per hundred pounds.

Roseberry & Simpson, of Bourbon, sold 2,385 pounds of tobacco for a total of \$286.57, or an average of \$12.23 per hundred pounds.

In spite of the inferior grades of tobacco offered at the sale of the Bourbon Tobacco Warehouse Co., yesterday, good prices prevailed through-

out the day, and the sale was one of the most satisfactory of the season. A total of 7,759 pounds were sold at a general average of \$12.34.

The consignments at the sale yesterday were poor and medium grades, but the bidding was very spirited, and the top price of the day was obtained for a portion of the crop of Mr. O. P. Clay, which went for \$21 per hundred.

In the sale yesterday was tobacco from adjoining counties, much of the offering being from Montgomery and Clark, the fact having gone broadcast that the price on the local market was holding up to a greater extent than any other market in Central Kentucky. Growers as a whole were well satisfied with the price obtained for their consignments, and rejections were very few.

Tobacco of extra quality has been very scarce on the local market, but the demand for the choice offerings has been very brisk. The same conditions prevailing in other places makes it necessary for the buyers to satisfy themselves with the best that can be procured.
