**TOBACCO**  
The publication of the following newspaper story is of great interest to the growers of Bourbon county, who will receive a total of \$17,283.63 from the 1907 and 1909 pools. Checks have been received by the First National Bank in this city, for distribution among those who were in the pool for the two years referred to above. All holding 1909 receipts may receive their money at any time by calling at the bank and surrendering their receipts.

John T. Collins, a member of the Board of Control of the Burley Tobacco Society, requests the members of the 1907 pool to meet him at the First National Bank, on Saturday, April 4, when they will receive their checks. In the 1907 pool, the sum of \$13,373 will be distributed, and in the 1909 pool, a total of \$3,910.63. The delay in making the final distribution of these funds by the Burley Society was unavoidable, and was rendered necessary by litigation in the courts, as number of suits were instituted against the Society.


