

### KENTUCKY CORN CROP WORTH MORE THAN OTHERS

The corn crop of Kentucky is worth more than all the other farm crops combined. Its estimated value in 1913 was \$56,867,000, more than twice that of the State's tobacco crop.

The year 1913 was not a good corn year and the average yield for this State was only 20 bushels an acre. Some of the best of the corn growing States did not do so well, but the average yield for the country at large was 24 bushels. In acreage Kentucky ranks 11th among the States, but in 1913 thirty-four States reported a higher yield. In 1910 and 1912, better crop years, the State's average was approximately 30 bushels, but the average in more than half the States of the Union was higher.

The figures show conclusively that the corn growers of the State are not getting the results they ought to get from their efforts. Kentucky had 3,650,000 acres in corn in 1913. Silo improvement, more care in seed corn selected and better methods of cultivation would double the production of the more than three million acres of land that Kentucky is planting every year in corn. Indeed, it is safe to say that with only moderate improvement in these particulars on the part of the rank and file of the farmers, there would be a material increase of production—and that without any increase in acreage.

The average yield of corn in some of our counties is as low as 15 bushels. That this is due solely to poor methods has been demonstrated by the boys' corn clubs which, in every section of the State, from the mountains to the Mississippi River, have made records of 100 bushels and more to the acre.

### CULTIVATION AND YIELD.

In some sections it is a common practice to plant the corn a little thicker when raised for silage than for grain. Weeds should be kept out, or they will be cut with the corn and may impair the quality of the silage. The amount of silage that can be obtained from an acre of corn will vary from 4 to 20 tons or more. A 50-bushel per acre of corn will yield about 8 to 12 tons of silage per acre, depending upon the amount of foliage and stalk that accompanies the ear. Southern varieties of corn as a rule carry a larger proportion of the plant in the form of stalk and leaves than do the northern-grown varieties. Corn should be harvested for the silo at about the same time it is harvested for fodder.

### Sorghums.

Sorghums, both saccharine and non-saccharine, are readily made into silage. On account of their superiority to corn as drought resisting crops they are more commonly grown in those regions of the West where the rainfall is too light or irregular for a good growth of corn. It is important that the sorghums be harvested at the proper stage of maturity if the best results are to be secured. A mixture of corn and sorghum has proved satisfactory in some localities where the rainfall was so variable as to make the corn crop uncertain.

### Clover.

Clover can be used successfully as a silage crop yielding a palatable product high in protein, but preferable to make it into hay, or the silage made from clover, as from other legumes, has an objectionable odor, necessitating particular care in feeding to avoid tainting the milk. It does not pack so well as corn.
