TOBACCO WAREHOUSES MAY BE LATE IN OPENING.
It was stated here to-day that in all probability the loose leaf warehouses throughout the growing districts in Central Kentucky may be later in opening this fall than usual on account of the crop being late in maturing. The Lexington Exchange will fix the time for opening the Lexington warehouses, which it is predicted will be set for not earlier than November 15 or possibly as late as December 1. While no authoritative statement has been given out by the officials of the Bourbon Tobacco Warehouse, in this city, it is probable that the house may be somewhat later in opening, for the same reason.


