

## EXCAVATION OF VERA CRUZ POSTPONED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—President Wilson and Secretary Bryan have decided not to fix a date for the evacuation of Vera Cruz by the American troops until it is determined which faction can dominate that section of Mexico sufficiently to carry out the guarantees asked by the United States as a prerequisite to its withdrawal.

Gen. Candido Aguilera is in command of most of the troops in the immediate vicinity of Vera Cruz and is believed to be loyal to Gen. Carranza, who is in open conflict with the national convention, which declared Gen. Eulalio Gutierrez provisional president of Mexico.

The President is unwilling to withdraw the troops until the various guarantees asked for can be enforced and there is no danger that some other faction on becoming dominant will disclaim responsibility for negotiations hitherto conducted with Gen. Carranza.

**WANT CAROTHERS REMOVED.**  
MEXICO, CITY, Nov. 13.—Foreign Minister Fabela, through his newspaper, El Pueblo, Thursday morning called on President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan to remove from office George C. Carothers, confidential agent of the State Department with Villa. Without any mincing of words, Carothers is charged with persistent intruding in Mexican politics, "for motives which are neither diplomatic nor disinterested."

# EARLY WAR NEWS

## GERMANS SAID TO HAVE LOST 90,000.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Telegraphing from the north of France under date of Thursday, the correspondent of the Times says:

"According to German officers who have fallen into the hands of the allies, about half a million men were fighting against the allies at the beginning of the great battle on the Yser.

"These officers put the German casualties at 90,000. In one case a regiment of infantry made up from the marine service and which was 1,800 strong, had only eight men left.

"Five generals were killed and the losses among the officers were extraordinary heavy."

## MILLION MORE TROOPS.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—It is reported in the parliamentary lobbies that Premier Asquith will on Tuesday ask Parliament's sanction for the raising of 1,000,000 additional troops for the purpose of the war.

Much interest is shown in the financing of the war. It is understood the Government intends to issue a war loan of \$1,000,000,000 in more, probably at 4 per cent. and redeemable within ten years.

## 82-YEAR OLD BRITISH GENERAL TO FRONT.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Field Marshal Lord Roberts of Kandahar is going to France. The official announcement making this fact public says the famous General is going into the war zone "to see the Indian troops." Lord Roberts was born in Cawnpore, India, eighty-two years ago.

## MONEY TO TRANSPORT FOOD-STUFFS TO STARVING BELGIANS.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The American Commission for Relief in Belgium has received a check on the Bank of England for \$3,000,000, which was contributed by prominent Belgians interested in the relief of their countrymen.

With the work in Belgium well under way the commission is now prepared to assume the permanent task of keeping Belgians supplied with food. In this connection it has made the following statement:

"The American Commission for Relief in Belgium, Thursday, received a check for \$3,000,000, which, it is estimated, will be necessary for the transportation of food-stuffs for the next three months from various parts of the world into Belgium. This money has been advanced to the commission under the guarantee given by various Belgian Relief Committees and important Belgians."

## GERMAN AVIATORS NEAR LONDON.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—(By wireless.)—According to information given out to the press to-day in official quarters German aviators have flown over the English seaports of Sheerness and Harwich.

Sheerness is a fortified seaport in Kent at the mouth of the Thames. It is about 40 miles from London. Harwich is in Essex and about 70 miles northeast of London.

## MRS. EDWARD BURNAM HUME NOTED IN RESEARCH WORK.

A recent issue of the Louisville Herald contains the following appreciation of Mrs. Edward Burnam Hume, well-known in Paris, where she has been a frequent and welcome visitor, and whose success in literary research has brought her more than local fame.

"Mrs. Edward Burnam Hume, who is well-known and liked throughout the state, has the distinction of being the first woman in Louisville to make a profession of library research work, gathering data for papers for men and women who are too busy or are unwilling to go through the necessary amount of labor to secure such things for themselves.

"Mrs. Hume has served in the public library, and is well qualified for the work she has undertaken. It was eighteen months ago, when she was in one of the departments of the library, that she realized the need for some one to do research work.

"Her familiarity with the different departments of the library, with its rules and the training she received there, admirably equip her for such work.

"Mr. and Mrs. Hume came with their son and daughter, to Louisville from Richmond served years ago, and they have made many friends in Louisville. Mrs. Hume is interested in club work, and has for some time been identified with a number of organizations.

"Through her large family connection and her own personal charm, she is widely known, and, since deciding to make research work a serious business for herself, Mrs. Hume has been kept busy. Every day requests for data on an endless variety of subjects come to her from all over Kentucky.

"Not only from men and women who are remote from the advantages to be had from proximity of a public library, but from her own townspeople does she have calls and while there is a great variety of subjects on which queries are sent, questions regarding agriculture are in the majority.

"Mrs. Hume says she finds the work absorbingly interesting, and at all hour of the day she may be seen in the different departments of the library poring over volumes great and small.

"Work similar to that being done by Mrs. Hume has become a profitable business to innumerable women and men in such cities as Washington, New York, Boston, Philadelphia and other large places, and although she has taken up the work only within the last few weeks, Mrs. Hume has succeeded beyond her brightest expectations."
