RELIEF FOR KENTUCKY IN QUARANTINE SITUATION.

In eighty of the 120 counties in Kentucky the Federal quarantine against the inter-state shipment of live stock was lifted Friday. The order authorizing this action was signed by the Secretary of Agriculture Thursday afternoon and the railroads were notified to accept shipments of cattle, sheep and swine to other States from localities where the Federal quarantine has been raised or modified.

Twenty-four of the forty counties that will remain under the Federal ban for an indefinite period will receive partial relief as the result of the order issued Thursday. These counties are Jefferson, Bourbon, Scott, Kenton, Campbell, Taylor, Spencer, Washington, Jessamine, Edmonson, Shelby, Meade, Hardin, Bullitt, Anderson, Boone, Breckinridge. Live stock for immediate slaughter may be shipped from these counties, beginning Friday, after Government inspectors have given the animals a clean bill of health.

The other counties in Kentucky still under quarantine are Grant, Henry, Shelby, Meade, Hardin, Bullitt, Anderson, Woodford, Nelson, Hart, Larue, Marion, Green, Metcalf, Barron and Allen.

In the opinion of live stock dealers the Department of Agriculture has been generous, though tardy, in modifying the quarantine regulations in Kentucky. The lifting of the bars in eighty counties, leaves only sixteen counties under absolute quarantine in the State.

FOREST NOTES.

White pine and yellow pine are the woods most used for boxes, and each contributes more than a billion feet to the box industry annually.

The annual cut of British Columbia timber is approximately two billion feet. There are 420 mills and 790 logging camps in the province, employing 60,000 men.

The Massachusetts forestry association offers as a prize the planting of fifty acres of white pine, to the town which gains first place in a contest for town forests.

The Boise National forest in Idaho had 30 fires during the past summer, yet 28 were down to less than 10 acres, and of these 15 were less than one-quarter of an acre. The supervisor says this success was due to a lookout tower, and to efficient telephone and heliograph service.

Because of the war, English manufacturers and consumers of wood pulp have been caused considerable uneasiness. Production is at a standstill in the countries at war, and in Norway and Sweden, principal sources of supply, mills have been greatly hampered because of a lack of coal and of chemicals. England has practically no domestic sources of pulp.

"Seven Keys to Baldpate." "Seven Keys to Baldpate," George M.
