SOCIALISTS LEADERS GIVEN 20-YEAR SENTENCES.

CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—A maximum sentence of 20 years in Leavenworth Prison was imposed by Federal Judge Landis Thursday on Congressman-elect Victor L. Berger, of Milwaukee, and four other Socialist leaders, who in final pleas compared themselves to history's greatest martyrs.

The five men, convicted of conspiracy to obstruct the draft in violation of the espionage act, obtained their releases on \$25,000 bail from Judge Alschuler. They declared they would carry their legal fight to the United States Supreme Court.

Besides Berger, publisher of a Milwaukee newspaper, the other convicted men are: Rev. Irwin St. John Tucker, lecturer and writer; Adolph Germer, National Secretary of the Socialist party; J. Louis Engdahl, editor of the American Socialist, and William F. Kruse, head of the Young People's Socialist League.

Judge Landis overruled motions for

a new trial, for a stay of execution and for bail, but granted the filing of a petition for a writ of error. Counsel for the convicted men then went before Judge Samuel P. Alschuler, of the United States Circuit of Appeals, and asked for bail.

Judge Alschuler granted them bail, increased from \$10,000 to \$25,000, with the understanding that they refrain from resuming their former acts and utterances during pendency of their case. William Cross Lloyd, Chicago millionaire, who was the Socialist candidate for United States Senator at the last election, appeared and offered to provide surety for the five, but scheduled only one fourth of the \$500,000 required.

The men were placed technically in the custody of the Federal Marshal, and late in the night their bonds had not been perfected.

The new bonds had been fixed at \$25,000 on each count, and each of the five was found guilty on two counts. The surety was required to be double the sum fixed, or \$500,000 for all.

ASSASSIN ATTEMPTS LIFE OF "TIGER OF FRANCE."

PARIS, FRANCE, Feb. 21.—"Resting comfortably," is the latest word concerning the condition of Georges Clemenceau, Premier of France, who was struck by three bullets from the revolver of a would-be assassin as he was riding in a limousine to the Hotel Crillon Wednesday morning.

One of the bullets entered his right shoulder and lodged in the left shoulder, the two others caused only flesh wounds, their driving power being checked and almost stopped by the heavy fur coat the Premier was wearing.

There is a good omen in the fact that the bullet which did cause actual internal injury went clear through the flesh from shoulder to shoulder, leaving the spinal cord and lungs untouched. No arteries were severed.

The would-be assassin, is under arrest, though doubts still shroud his identity. His name is said to be Emile Cottin. One report says he is a confirmed anarchist. His age is given as 19 years.

The fanatical mania with which he was possessed, was shown by the boldness of the attack and the fact that he did not let loose of the trigger until every bullet in his pistol had been spent. But the vagueness of his aim resulting in most of the shots going wild, tends to confirm his youth and the idea that he is a crank. The bullet which wounded Premier Clemenceau penetrated his lungs, it was revealed by the official statement issued shortly after noon Thursday.

The official statement reads: "The hemorrhage which occurred at 1 o'clock yesterday demonstrated that the bullet penetrated the lungs. An X-ray examination disclosed the precise location of the bullet.

"The general condition is satisfactory. Temperature 98.4; pulse 72. "Nourishment is normal." (Signed) "GOSSETT, "TUFFIER, "LAUBREY, "COMBE."

After the X-ray examination had been completed Premier Clemenceau walked out on the balcony of his house, overlooking the garden, to take a breath of fresh air. The morning was a delightful one, the first real spring day.

The Premier seemed vigorous, although he spat a little blood. The announcement made in the official bulletin caused some anxiety in the immediate entourage of the Premier at his home, and the news that his condition was more serious than at first reported spread quickly throughout Paris, causing widespread expressions of sympathy.

The Premier, however, bore up remarkably well during the morning, refusing to return to his bed and receiving numerous callers, among whom were William G. Sharp, the American Ambassador, and Admiral Benson, U. S. N.

The Ambassador told the Associated Press representative that he found Premier Clemenceau in the best of spirits, displaying wonderful courage, and cheerfulness.

Cottin, who shot Premier Clemenceau, probably will be tried under the law of 1893, passed after an anarchist attempt in the French Chamber of Deputies, by which he is liable to the death penalty even though death does not result from the attempt. He will be tried in the Assizes Court and not by a court-martial, as Paris is no longer in a state of siege.
