BAPTISTS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN

Kentucky Baptists are becoming very enthusiastic over the 75 Million Dollar Campaign that the Southern Baptists are planning to raise in cash and pledges, November 30 to December 7, 1919. Of this large sum of money, Kentucky was only asked to give six and one-half million dollars, but now that the campaign is getting under full swing, the Baptists of the State and of the territory are all saying that this will be exceeded. Many speeches have been made about the campaign and the causes that will be benefited by the money given have been explained. As the people see the needs and realize what a privilege it is to have part in such a great undertaking, they are all agreed that more should be done, and Kentucky Baptist are so enthusiastic that everywhere the slogan is, "Do more than is asked."

There are 76 associations in the State and the majority of these have now held their annual meeting and one has failed to heartily accept its apportionment and practically every association, as well as every church, has said, "We expect to go beyond what we are asked to do."

PRESIDENT WILSON SAID TO BE IMPROVING.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—President Wilson continues to improve and passed a satisfactory night, said a bulletin issued and signed by Rear Admiral Grayson, the President's physician; Rear Admiral Stitt, head of the Naval Medical School here, and Dr. Sterling Ruffin, of this city.

Amplifying the bulletin Dr. Grayson said there was a slight improvement in the President's condition and that he again insisted upon attending to public matters he considered pressing. The President particularly desired to write a message to the Industrial Conference to be read at the opening session Monday.

Dr. Grayson said he was not yet ready for the President to do any work and would continue to insist that he have absolute quiet and rest and keep his mind away from official matters. The physician fears that any excessive activity on the part of the President might cause a reaction.

While a spirit of optimism prevades the White House Monday because of the continued improvement in the President's condition Dr. Grayson said he did not want to be too optimistic and would continue to watch his patient carefully.

SLAUGHTER OF WHITES PLANNED BY NEGROES

HELENA, ARK., Oct. 7.—Bands of negroes in southern Phillips County, of which this city is the seat of government, had planned a general slaughter of white people in this locality Monday according to members of the committee of seven appointed by civil authorities with the sanction of Governor Charles Brough who announced that confessions made by some of the captured negroes and other information indicated a widespread plot.

Members of the committee said the plans of the negroes included an uprising in the event certain demands were not met. With October 6 set as the day for the uprising, negro prisoners are said to have confessed, each member of the organization at specified places was to take a bale of cotton by that date to certain prominent land owners, plantation managers and merchants and "demand a settlement."


