FUEL RESTRICTION ORDERS ISSUED FOR TO-DAY.

Orders eliminating electric signs and display advertising, limiting industries, except public utilities and plants engaged in continuous operations, to forty-eight hours' operation a week, restricting the hours of stores and office buildings to 9 a. m. to 4 p. m., and theatres, movies and all other public amusement places to 1 p. m. to 10:30 p. m., were announced Sunday by the Regional Coal Committee, effective throughout the Southern region at noon yesterday.

No orders to the local Fuel Administrator, James H. Thompson, to this effect, were received here up to last night, and until this has been definitely established the people are in a state of uncertainty as to what they should do. Merchants were on the anxious seat yesterday regarding the matter, and a number of them, including the clothing houses, agreed among themselves to observe the restrictions as outlined above.

Paris is in the Southern region controlled by the committee which issued the above order, so, unless there is a change in the situation, we bid fair to experience to some extent at least, "lightless nights and heatless days" for a while.

Two prominent citizens of the county told THE NEWS yesterday that, while on their way to church, they saw four trains on the Louisville & Nashville, heavily loaded with coal, one train in each block, while on another track was the same number of empties, going South. Large quantities of coal have been observed here, and on trains passing through.

STORM VISITS BOURBON.

A wind storm of great velocity, accompanied by heavy rainfall, visited this section Friday, doing considerable damage. A large barn on the farm of Willis Liver, near Austerlitz, was blown down, and the crop of tobacco it contained was ruined by rain. Roads leading into Paris were dotted with telephone poles and dead wood blown down by the storm. For the third time within a month the streams of the county were bankful. The storm was an off-shoot from a big storm that hit the West hard the preceding day.

BAKER HELD TO APPEAR BEFORE GRAND JURY.

The examining trial of H. R. Baker, arrested in Louisville and brought to Paris by Deputy Sheriff James Gibson on charges of embezzlement and passing worthless checks, was held before County Judge George Batterson, Saturday. The evidence adduced at the trial showed that Baker had paid a portion of the money for the purchase of an automobile from J. M. Scott. After hearing the testimony and the arguments for the prosecution by County Attorney D. D. Cline and for the defense by Judge Denis Dundon, Judge Batterson held Baker in \$100 bond to appear before the grand jury at the next term of the Bourbon Circuit Court. Baker's wife and mother were present at the trial. When it was ascertained that warrants were ready in the hands of Lexington police to be served on him for alleged "cold" check transactions there, Baker decided to remain here and take his chances.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

At a special meeting of the City Council, last night, presided over by Mayor E. B. January, the following new members of that body, elected at the November election, were sworn in, and took their seats as Councilmen: George Doyle, Edward Burke, N. Ford Brent, Hugh Brent, James Moreland, John J. Williams and Catesby Spears. This being the sole object of the special meeting the Council adjourned until the regular meeting night.

At the last regular meeting of the Council, which was the last meeting of the old Council, all the members were present except Councilman George Doyle. This body gave the city a very creditable administration of affairs and retired with the good will of the people of Paris.

An ordinance was passed calling for an election on Dec. 27, for the purpose of voting on the question of a \$35,000 bond issue for completing the additions to the white and colored public schools of Paris. The Paris Milling Company was paid the sum of \$460 as the city's part in building the new dam across Stoner Creek near the Milling Co.'s property, which was recently completed. Following complaints of the contractors who are resurfacing Pleasant street with concrete several persons who had driven over the street before the concrete was dry were served with notices. These parties appeared before the authorities and agreed to make good the amount of damages alleged to have been sustained. The City Engineer reported serious defects in the recently completed sanitary sewer, which he estimated would require about \$10,000 to remedy, and advised that repairs be made before final settlement is made with the contractor, A. D. Sant.

BOLD THIEVES STEAL TOBACCO FROM BARN.

Bold thieves backed a wagon up to a tobacco barn on the farm of George Jones, on the Clintonville pike, near Paris, and made away with a quantity of tobacco estimated at about four hundred pounds, worth in the market in the neighborhood of \$200. The tobacco has not been recovered nor the thieves apprehended.

On the same night a thief or thieves visited a tobacco barn belonging to Dr. Wm. Kenney, and stole about \$70 worth of the weed. Dr. Kenney immediately got on the trail and suspicion falling on a colored boy named Henry Washington, a warrant was issued for his arrest. Dr. Kenney was informed that Washington had been seen peddling the tobacco in small quantities in various parts of the city. Following up the clues Dr. Kenney came unexpectedly upon his quarry, and took him to the Paris jail.

CONTRACT SIGNED FOR ROBIN HOOD.
