### SUPT. COLVIN CALLS ATTENTION TO INSTITUTE.

Superintendent of Public Instruction George Colvin has addressed communications to county school superintendents calling their attention to certain sections of the law relating to county teachers' institutes.

Under the law the county superintendent shall revoke the certificate of any teacher who shall fail to attend the full session of the institute, unless the superintendent shall be fully satisfied that such failure has been caused by actual sickness or other disability.

Another section of the law provides that "at each session of the institute every subject embraced in the common school course shall be brought before the institute, illustrated and discussed and every feature of school organization and school management, together with the whole work of the teacher, shall be considered and the common school laws of the State read and expounded." Superintendent Colvin urges that this section be enforced.

#### WALLIS IS WILLING

(New York Evening Telegram) While admitting that he has received no word from Washington in regard to the deportation of any reds, Frederick A. Wallis, new Commissioner of Immigration on Ellis Island, has expressed himself as favoring more Soviet arks.

"To my way of thinking, the best way to get revolutionists out of the United States and back to their home lands is the quickest way. I can see no objection to sending two whips away as soon as possible. We have only fifty-eight of the anarchist class on the island, but I am informed there are from 600 to 800 in federal prisons throughout the country."

This is frank and outspoken enough. In addition to the fifty-eight anarchists on the island Commissioner Wallis might furnish a list of those who have been admitted to bail within the year. He might also take the people into confidence by stating bluntly what individuals or influences stand in the way of deportation.

Latest excuse of Assistant Secretary of Labor Post was that there was no place in Russia where we could land deportees.

Then why is the "Soviet envoy" permitted to remain here and do business?
