DEALERS REPORT FINE YIELD BLUE GRASS SEED

The total quantity of commercial Kentucky Bluegrass seed that was harvested this year promises to be equal to or slightly greater than last year. Weather conditions during the past few weeks have been favorable for the setting and maturing of the seed. Stripping began around June 15 and the seed was of heavy weight and high germination. A slightly decreased acreage of Kentucky Bluegrass was harvested for seed in Kentucky this year because some of the Bluegrass meadows have been plowed and planted to tobacco and corn, which crops are considered at this time to be more remunerative. The favorable weather during the past few weeks has been conducive to the proper development and ripening of the seed and the indications are that the quality of this year's seed will be superior to that of last year.

The 1919 crop seed was light and chaffy because of the freeze the last of April and first of May and because of the hot, dry weather just before stripping was begun. The production in this section last year is estimated to have been 350,000 bushels stripped seed, which cleaned out only about 55 or 60 per cent. by weight.

This year, however, because of a prospective increase of about 33 1-3 per cent in the yield per acre it is estimated that the total production will be 425,000 bushels, which should clean out about 65 or 70 per cent by weight. Based on these figures the production of re-cleaned seed this year will be about 35 per cent greater than in 1919. No price has been established for the rough seed as practically no contracts have been made. Shippers would buy the rough seed at \$1.50 per bushel, but growers state that because of the advance in the price of land, equipment, and labor they must receive a higher price than last year, which was \$1.50 to \$1.65 per bushel.

URGES YOUNG MEN TO ENLIST IN GUARD.

Young men of the State are urged to revive comradeship in arms by enrolling in the Kentucky National Guard, in an appeal sent out by J. M. DeWeese, Adjutant General of Kentucky. Major DeWeese recently returned from Washington, where he was successful in obtaining a favorable decision from the War Department to organize National Guard units in Kentucky with a minimum strength of fifty men.

The text of Major DeWeese's appeal is as follows: "Young men of the State, I appeal to you to revive the comradeship in arms with a willingness to serve your nation in peace no less than in war. A State composed of citizens who are not willing to defend it against foes within or without can not be expected to endure. The military of the State has no choice in disputes among groups representing various interests. It is simply the force back of the law which guarantees the largest measure of justice to all. Therefore, it should be constituted of men representing all shades of religious and political belief and opinions. No good citizen has ever regretted service with the colors.

"Join the Kentucky National Guard and discharge your obligation as a citizen; increase your income; enlarge your experience by association and travel; enjoy the most wholesome recreation and, at the same time, retain your business status undisturbed.


