THE FIRST BOURBON DISTILLERY

The latter days of whisky making in Bourbon county are familiar to everyone, but its inception and early days are known possibly to only a few of the older citizens who have received their information from their grandparents. The first whisky was made in Bourbon county in 1790 by Jacob Spears, great grandfather of Woodford and Catesby Spears, and John Hamilton, the great grandfather of William Remington, editor of the Paris Democrat. The distillery was located about three miles from Paris on the Ruddles Mills pike, where the John T. Redmon distillery was afterward built.

Spears and Hamilton, and a few companions secured a large canoe and came down the Ohio river to the mouth of Limestone creek, where Maysville now is located. From there they went to Ruddle Station by way of the Buffalo path. Hamilton remained in Kentucky until the whisky insurrection broke out in Western Pennsylvania, at which time he returned by the wilderness route, and, arriving, found an army encamped on his brothers' farm to put down the insurrection. His brother refused to pay the tax on his still. He had made up his mind to allow the still to be confiscated.

The following year they raised some corn and rye and manufactured the same into whisky. They only doubled once a week, and the men would come in every Saturday from the neighboring stations and drink as much as they could, and carry the balance home with them to supply their wants until the next Saturday. The yield was six to eight gallons a week.

PAINTING SHOWS PROPOSED MEMORIAL BRIDGE

Showing in colors how the proposed War Mothers' memorial bridge spanning the Kentucky River in front of the State Capitol at Frankfort will look when it has been completed, the original water color rendering by Leo L. Oberwarth, Frankfort architect, now hangs in the lobby of the Lafayette Hotel, in Lexington. It will remain there for several weeks and then will be taken to some other city, probably Louisville, it was said.

The memorial bridge at Frankfort and the soldiers memorial building at the University of Kentucky to cost \$300,000, both will be in commemoration of the sacrifices made by Kentucky's soldiers in the World War. The State convention of War Mothers last October endorsed the memorial at Frankfort, but it is understood no active moves toward its realization are to be made until the memorial buildings have been secured.

The bridge-monument received from the last General Assembly its strongest endorsement, with the suggestion that it be made a part of the State highway plans adopted by the Legislature. An effort will be made by the State War Mothers to obtain support of the next General Assembly in making the bridge possible, it is stated. Mrs. William Dowell Oldham, Lexington, is head of the State organization.

The bridge is to cross the Kentucky River at the head of Main street, Frankfort, its southern end resting on Capitol avenue, a street 150 feet in width and ending with the State Capitol and Governor's mansion. Architecturally it is designed strictly in harmony with the Capitol.
