Every President of the United States from the days of U. S. Grant to the present, has received a call at some time during his administration from Augustus E. Wilson, once Governor of Kentucky. President Harding also received his call. Former Governor Wilson explained that perhaps Henry Watterson had his record beaten as he had probably called on every President since Washington.

The call had no political significance and was merely to pay his respects and keep up his custom, Mr. Wilson said.

REMARKABLE EVENTS IN DAY'S NEWS.

Alban Jones, retired naval captain, paid \$2.75 for a ticket in a race in England. It was on Humorist and Humorist won. Joel's race horse which won the Epsom Downs Derby on June 1, was found dead in his stable at Wantage, England, Sunday, according to The Daily Mail. Death was due to natural causes.

INVESTIGATE ANIMAL DISEASES

More than 430 laboratory and field examinations as to the nature and prevalence of domestic animal diseases in Kentucky were made during the year ending June 30, 1921, by the veterinary department of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, according to the thirty-third annual report of that institution.

ENGAGED COUPLES HAVE EACH INSURABLE INTEREST

Engaged couples have an insurable interest in the life of each other, according to an opinion handed down by the Court of Appeals reversing the Adair Circuit Court in the case of Lily Harden against Onie Harden.

Virgil A. Harden took out an insurance policy in the Modern Brotherhood of America for \$3,000 on February 19, 1919. At the time he was engaged to a young woman whom he married on March 11, 1919, and the question arose whether the wife, Lily Harden, was entitled to all or one-half of his personal estate, as the proceeds from his life insurance policy became a part of his personal estate, the law giving the wife one-half and the mother one-half.

The Lower Court held that the proceeds of the policy should be divided, but the Appellate Court decided all of the proceeds go to the wife, holding that engaged couples have an insurable interest in the life of each other.

Health Board Notice

Street Letting

BOARD OF COUNCIL, PARIS, KY., BOURBON COUNTY:

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Board of Council, in the City Building, until 8:00 o'clock, p. m., July 14, 1921, to construct the streets hereinafter described and as covered by an ordinance authorizing said work, by the original construction of the roadways thereof, with Vitrified Block, Sheet Asphalt, Kentucky Rock Asphalt, Asphaltic Concrete, Plain Concrete Paving, or other types of paved streets: Tenth street from the east margin of Main street to the west margin of Pleasant street, and Main street from Bank Row to the bridge over Stoner creek.

A certified check to the amount of ten (10) per cent. of the aggregate bid, or a bidder's bond in the penal sum of Two Thousand Dollars, (\$2,000.00) must be submitted with the bid. The nature and extent of the bond required will be a guarantee that the improvement will require no repairs for a period of five (5) years from and after the acceptance of the work by the Board of Council; said guarantee shall not include any repairs made necessary by any cause or causes other than defective work, or materials, or workmanship in the construction of the improvement, but shall protect the city of Paris from defects in amount equal to the penalty of the bond for a period of five years after the acceptance of the work by the Board of Council. The surety shall be a guarantee or surety company, authorized to do business in the State of Kentucky and approved by the Board of Council.

Drawings and specifications of said work are on file in the office of the City Engineer.

The Board of Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids and also the right to award the contracts on any and all work to the lowest and best bidder.
