DON'T FAIL TO REGISTER

Special registration for the city of Paris will be held at the office of County Clerk Pearce Paton, to-morrow, Saturday, July 23. At this time it will be necessary for all who are not already registered voters of the precinct of their residence since last registration day to register with the Clerk in order to be entitled to vote in the August primary.

This registration is only for persons who were unable to register last fall on account of sickness in the family or unavoidable absence from the city on registration day, or who have moved into the county and become legal voters since last registration. It is also for the purpose of enabling those persons who have moved from one precinct to another since last election to get transfers, and for all who have become of age since last elections but for no one else.
