WARREN

—Wm. H. Warren, aged thirty-three, of Lexington, died Wednesday morning at his home in that city. He was a member of the Transylvania Printing Co., and a graduate of Transylvania College. Mr. Warren was well-known in Paris. The funeral will be held this (Friday) afternoon, at the Broadway Christian church. The burial will follow on the family lot in the Lexington Cemetery.

WILSON

—Following a long illness, due to a complication of diseases, Mrs. Kate Lowry Wilson, aged forty-six, died at her home on Mt. Airy avenue, in this city, Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Wilson had been in bad health for some time, but was thought to have been improving recently. About ten days ago she was stricken again, and despite all that could be done, sank gradually until her sufferings were ended by death.

Mrs. Wilson was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Felix Lowry, and was born in this county on August 6, 1875. The family moved from their country home to Paris many years ago, and made their home on Mt. Airy Avenue. Mrs. Wilson was universally admired for her many traits of character, and had a host of friends in the city and county who regret her passing. She was united in marriage to James B. Wilson, of Paris, and to the union came two daughters, Mrs. Katherine W. Taylor and Miss Anna H. Wilson, both of whom reside at the family home. Her sister, Miss Lucy H. Lowry, of Cincinnati, was at her bedside when the end came.

The funeral was held at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon, with services conducted at the grave in the Paris Cemetery, by Rev. T. S. Smylie, pastor of the Paris Presbyterian church. The pall-bearers were: Rudolph Davis, Charles N. Fithian, Frank M. Clay, Charles A. Webber, Dr. Wm. Kenney and Dr. W. C. Ussery.

HERRIN

—Miss Gladys Herrin, aged sixteen, died at 6:30 o'clock, Tuesday night, at the home of her aunt, Mrs. Wm. Farris, on Pleasant street, where she had resided for several years. Miss Herrin's death was due to a complication resulting from typhoid fever, and spinal meningitis.

Miss Herrin was the daughter of Mr. Edward Herrin, of Paris. Her death was a peculiarly sad one. Since the death of her mother, several years ago she had made her home with her aunt, Mrs. Farris. Lovely in face and figure, with a sweet disposition, she was a favorite in a large circle of friends, who will miss her glad smile and her sweet presence. Stricken a few weeks ago with typhoid fever, she lingered at death's door, until a few days ago, when the crisis was thought to have passed and that she would recover. A relapse set in resulting in her death.

Besides her father, she is survived by one sister, Miss Geraldine Herrin, of Paris, and several aunts and uncles.

The funeral was held at the home of Mrs. Farris, on Pleasant street, yesterday afternoon at three o'clock, with services conducted by Rev. W. E. Ellis, pastor of the Paris Christian church. The burial followed on the family lot in the Paris Cemetery. The pall-bearers were the following schoolmates of the dead girl: Marion Gorman, Joseph Waller, L. T. Leach, Foster Mitchell, Elmer Newman and Sello Wollstein.


