RESULTS FROM BURLEY BALLOTS

Election of Delegates Close Tuesday
With Total of 1,170 Ballots
Being Cast

SAMUEL CLAY IS DIRECTOR

When the final tally of ballots was made by the election commissioners at noon Tuesday for the Bourbon County branch of the Co-operative Burley Tobacco Marketing Association for delegates to the Lexington meeting, it was announced that the following had been selected by the votes of over 1,170 growers: Sam Clay, Ed. Burke, Wm. Collins, W. D. McIntyre, James McClure, John Willie Jones, James M. Caldwell, Chas. C. Clarke, John Woodford, V. W. Ferguson. These were selected from a list of twenty names recommended at a previous meeting held in the court house.

At three o'clock in the afternoon of the same day the delegates assembled in the offices of the Peoples and Deposit Bank & Trust Company, and elected Sam Clay, as director for Bourbon county in the final organization of the Association. When Mr. Jos. Passaneau was notified at the headquarters of the Association in Lexington of Mr. Clay's selection, he congratulated the growers of Bourbon county on their wisdom in making so fortunate a choice.

Equal suffrage held true in this election, as a large number of women participated in the battle of the ballots, they being members of the Association, and cast their votes for their selection for delegates. The members of the committee were kept very busy up to a late hour Monday night counting the ballots, the final count not being completed until Tuesday at noon, when the result was announced.

The Burley Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association, largest co-operative marketing organization in the world, became an actuality Wednesday with the organization of the Board of Directors from the twenty-two districts into which the burley territory of Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky was divided several weeks ago by the election committee. The directors were elected at conventions held following primary elections of delegates which were held Monday in every one of the 61 counties in the burley district.

Final reports show slightly that more than 55,000 tobacco growers have joined the association and that almost 200,000,000 pounds of tobacco have been signed up to its marketing plan for next six years. Some idea of the magnitude of this association of farmers may be gathered from the fact that their product, which will be marketed through the co-operative association, as needed by the manufacturers, and not by the old auction system, will be worth from \$60,000,000 to \$100,000,000 annually, depending on the size of the crop and the price the manufacturers pay for it.

Of the 130 warehouses in the burley district not more than half a dozen will open for the sale of tobacco, almost every warehouseman having been a booster of the new association, and it is the purpose of the organization to take over these warehouses or to lease them, if the owner does not desire to sell.

Directors of the Burley Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association, Wednesday elected James C. Stone, of Lexington, president and general manager; Ralph M. Barker, of Carrollton, warehouse manager, and James C. Stone, James N. Kehoe, Bush W. Allen, John B. Winn, of Versailles, and Judge Robert W. Bingham, of Louisville, members of the executive committee.

Judge Bingham had previously been elected a director-at-large and the other two directors-at-large will be elected later, one from Ohio and one from Indiana.

Twenty-two directors were present when the board assembled at the offices of the association, 620 South Broadway. Following a brief informal discussion adjournment was taken by unanimous consent until 2 o'clock. After Robert E. Beatty, of Fayette county; Ralph M. Barker, of Carroll county, and Captain William Collins, of Bourbon county, had been chosen temporary directors-at-large to serve until the regular directors-at-large should be elected. MAYOR ISSUES ANOTHER VETO

Paris Executive Wields Veto Power
For Second Time On Council's
Ordinance

GIVES REASON FOR ACTION

Mayor E. B. January has again used the official axe and put his veto on a measure recently adopted by the new Board of Council of the city of Paris, and which he vetoed at the regular meeting of that body following the special meeting at which the measure was passed. The official document was filed Wednesday afternoon in the office of City Clerk J. W. Hayden. In the document Mayor January gives the following reasons for his exercise of the veto power:

"By virtue of authority vested in me by the charter of the City of Paris, I do hereby veto the following portions of that certain ordinance passed by your honorable body on Thursday night, December 15, 1921, under the following caption, to-wit: 'Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Council of the City of Paris, Ky., that the salaries of the hereinafter named officers of said city be and they are hereby fixed as follows,' which ordinance is found on page 380 of Minute Book II of the City Records.

"1. I object to and veto so much of said ordinance as fixes the salary of the City Attorney at \$50 a month, because I deem said sum excessive.

"2. I object to and veto so much of said ordinance as fixes the salary of the Chief of Police at \$100 a month, because I deem that salary insufficient.

"3. I object to and veto much of said ordinance as reads '5 patrolmen each \$100 a month,' because there is no provision of law for the election of five patrolmen and there is no necessity for five patrolmen or more than three patrolmen in the City of Paris at this time.

"4. I object to and veto so much of said ordinance as provides 'foreman of city works for a term of two years, \$85 a month,' because there is no provision of law for the election of said foreman for said term and there is no necessity for such election for said term.

"5. I object and veto so much of said ordinance as provides 'city treasurer, no compensation; city collector, \$500 a year,' because in my judgment, said two offices should be consolidated and the salary of \$500 is excessive, as adequate service can be secured by the consolidation of said offices at \$300 a year.

"In testimony whereof, witness my hand as Mayor of the City of Paris, Ky., this December 14, 1921."
