RURAL SCHOOL CHILDREN NEED HOT NOON LUNCHESES

With the opening of schools throughout Kentucky and the prospect of cold weather in the near future, the problem of the noon-day lunch for children in rural schools again has come to the front as an important one that demands attention, according to Miss Maybelle Cornell, head of the home economics department of the College of Agriculture. That this problem is receiving due consideration in many parts of the State is shown by the fact that a considerable number of schools are serving at least one hot dish to supplement the cold lunch brought by the children. However, the serious need of the hot lunch is realized by comparatively few persons.

"Under average conditions, rural school children in Kentucky follow a daily program that makes it necessary for them to get along on little more than two meals a day. As a rule they have breakfast at about 6 o'clock in the morning and by recess time are hungry enough to eat most the lunch which they have brought from home. What may be left after recess is insufficient for the noon lunch with the result that they go home hungry about 4 o'clock to eat another lunch that leaves them without any appetite for the evening meal. No man is willing to work on less than three full meals a day. School children, therefore, who are growing and studying can hardly be expected to do their best work on two meals a day.

"Perhaps the first requirement for starting a hot school lunch in any school is an active organization of persons interested in the welfare of the children that can superintend the project. This may be a parent-teachers' association, a community club or a group of farm women. The teacher of the school should naturally be a supporter of the project since she should be interested enough in her pupils to see that they are kept fit physically.

"Complete details dealing with starting a school lunch, financing the project, the equipment necessary, 15 suggested lunches and more than a score of receipts are given in extension circular No. 95, which may be obtained free by writing the Experiment Station, Lexington."

RAIL CONDUCTOR WINS IN COURT SUIT

Holding that an individual member of the Order of Railroad Conductors has the right to contract with his employer, Judge Lafon Allen in a written opinion handed down in joint session of the Circuit Court, at Covington, restored W. C. Stanfill, a passenger conductor on the Louisville & Nashville railroad, well-known in Paris, to a run he was recently removed from by the officials of the company.

The removal was made at the request of officers of the union and the company did not file an answer to the action, but entered its appearance to the suit and was represented at the hearing.

Stanfill had been on a day run between Cincinnati and Knoxville, passing through Paris, for seventeen years, and was transferred to a night run. Judge Allen said there had not been shown any grounds for the discharge of Stanfill, that his run had not been discontinued and there had not been any attempt by a senior to "roll" him, as is allowed by the rules and regulations when the run of a senior is abolished.

For that reason Stanfill is entitled to his former run, which will permit him to spend his days off at his home in Covington, Judge Allen said.

CUT COST OF HELIUM

Government Makes Greatest Price Reduction on Record.

Cost Is Dropped From \$2,000 to Nine Cents a Cubic Foot, and May Be Reduced to Five Cents—Only Plant in World.

Fort Worth, Tex.—The biggest price reduction on record has just been put into effect here by the government's helium plant. The cost has been cut from \$2,000 to 9 cents a cubic foot! Even at that there is no crowd at the doors to take advantage of the great reduction. Experiments are now going forward to make the cost only 5 cents.

An immense warehouse at the plant has stored in it 2,000,000 cubic feet of helium. Two weeks ago two carloads of the product were shipped East for army use. The institution has been closed for six months, but recently resumed operation, congress having appropriated \$800,000, which will keep the plant working for one year. When the plant is in full swing it is expected that 150 men will be employed there, and work will continue day and night.

This is the only helium plant in the whole world, giving this government a monopoly of the supply. Experiment has shown that only the Texas gas contains helium. Gas from other states and other countries, when tested, did not contain the element.

The Fort Worth plant was erected during the war and its first shipment was sent East before the war ended, but before it could reach France the armistice was declared. If the dirigibles during the war had been able to use helium, Lanham says military authorities informed him, the great conflict would have lasted no more than a year. On the other hand, if Germany had possessed this helium plant she could have sent her Zeppelins broadcast and destroyed cities in France and England without danger to the Zeppelins.

IS FIGHTING BOLL WEEVIL



Intensive study and experimentation is being carried on by J. L. Webb of the Department of Agriculture in charge of the southern field crop to find a means of eliminating the boll weevil, which has caused such a wholesale destruction of the cotton crop. Unless some remedy is applied, it will be only a question of a few years before the supply of cotton will be inadequate to meet the domestic needs much less the world demand, Mr. Webb declares. NINE JAP FLYERS DIE IN YEAR

During the Same Period 25 Were Wounded in 39,371 Flights, Says Report.

Tokyo.—During the last year in Japan nine aviators were killed and twenty-five wounded in 39,291 flights, the gross mileage of which was 812,960. These statistics were issued by the aviation department of the war office and include naval, military and civilian flyers, in reply to complaints that accidents had been frequent of late. These accidents, it is explained, were due to adverse atmospheric conditions above the central district of the country during spring and summer.

"As a whole, airplane accidents in this country are by no means so numerous as the recent frequency of accidental falls is apt to lead the people to believe," says the report.

Big Blue Oval Meteor Found on River Bottom

Fergus Falls, Minn.—A dredge working in the river here, below the central dam, brought up a meteor two feet long and shaped like an egg. The meteor is blue in color, heavier than granite, and hundreds of pebbles are buried in it. Engineers say it must have struck the river while flaming hot, and the pebbles sank into it when it fell.
