

OPPOSITE TYPES OF LIARS.—Two investigations are now going forward which develop liars of directly opposite types. One is the investigation, by the Senate Committee, of the alleged bribery in the election of Senator Kellogg, of Louisiana. In this proceeding the typical Louisiana liar appears in his brilliant colors; his distinguishing peculiarity being that he is ready to swear to anything and everything that either side is willing to pay him for. The other is the investigation into the case of the Utica liars, proceeding the typical Utica liar in striking contrast to his fellow craftsman of Louisiana. Not an Indian can be found who knows anything about the murder of Agent Mecker and his associates, or of the attack on Maj. Thornburgh's command. Not one of them had ever heard that the troops had been attacked. So that the prospect of discovering the guilty parties in both cases is equally doubtful, from directly opposite reasons. The Louisiana liar tells too much, and the Utica liar too little.

THE TELEGRAPHIC SYSTEM OF THE WORLD.—The system of telegraphs in Europe comprised, at the end of 1877, was 268,809 miles of lines, and 769,768 miles of wires. There were 19,627 Government telegraph stations, and 12,708 railway and special stations. The number of employees amounted to 61,984, and the number of instruments 708. The number of paid messages was, in round numbers, 86,000,000, of which 20,000,000 were international dispatches. The number of other telegrams forwarded amounted to about 7,000,000. Following statistics for the parts of the world. In America (1875 to 1877), 114,157 miles of wires; 8,756 stations; 29,000,000 telegrams. In Asia (1875 to 1876), 24,521 miles of wires; 489 stations; 2,300,000 telegrams. Australia (1875), 25,582 miles of wires; 639 stations; 3,500,000 telegrams. Africa (1874 to 1876), 8,148 miles of wires; 196 stations; 1,200,000 telegrams.

ANOTHER CURE FOR DIPHTHERIA.—As this dreaded disease is prevalent in many sections just now, and nothing relating to its cure is of interest to the general public. A lady friend, who has had considerable experience with the disease, informs us that she has been successful in treating it in numerous instances, both in her own family and her neighbors' families.
