This ruling is contrary to the frequent determination of the lower courts, and is a letting down of the law for divorced parties who wish to re-marry.

The receipts from internal revenue for October were \$12,366,219.48, an increase of \$1,787,769.62 over the corresponding month of last year. The receipts for the first nine months of the corresponding period of last year, an increase of \$1,776,855.24, over the same period of the corresponding year ending June 30, 1881, were \$134,982,550.15, which was an increase of \$11,359,416.50 over the receipts of the preceding twelve months. If the receipts of the present quarter, taken on a fair index, the increase for the year over the receipts of last year would be \$10,000,000, and the total of our internal revenue will not fall short of \$150,000,000.
