The following is a synopsis of the business heard by the Court that afternoon.

OPHANS' COURT BUSINESS.

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NEIGHBORHOOD NOTES.

The store of J. & G. H. Reimbold, at Grove City, was closed by the Sheriff of Meeker County, last Thursday morning, and Mr. Al. Duncan of Pymatung was appointed as assessor.

At Freeport, Pa., just an hour previous to the burial of his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Donnelly, aged 81 years, her son Thomas, 57 years of age, expired on Wednesday week. He had been in poor health for some time, and the shock of his mother's death proved fatal.

Robbin's Circus gave an exhibition at Millintown lately, and while the rings were giving attractions inside a much more exciting one took place outside. An elephant became unmanageable, broke away, swam across the Juniata river and tore madly up through a newly plowed field. A keeper and three attendants pursued on horseback and were two hours making the capture. During the chase an attack named Ford was caught by the elephant's trunk. He was pinned to the ground and made a narrow escape, his right leg being horribly mangled.

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A Strange Disaster.

The mining village of Locus Gap, in Northern Luzerne county and along the line of the Philadelphia and Reading R. R. was wrecked by a remarkable explosion last Saturday night, which also killed several of its citizens and injured twenty. A tremendous freight train, said to have consisted of seventy cars of mixed merchandise, including a carload of powder, glycerine, etc., was made up at the summit near the town and started north but a coupling broke, the train separated on a steep down grade, and came together again with a crash as it passed through the gap. The powder and glycerine made a concussion that partly destroyed village and was felt for twenty miles around.

At Locus Gap the railroad runs through a ravine in the foot of the mountain and is almost perpendicular to the mountain side for a distance of half a mile. It was at this point, where the declivity is steepest, that the collision occurred. One hundred feet below runs a branch of the Susquehanna creek, and parallel with it are two rows of houses, in each of which five nine families. The buildings were owned by the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company and were erected for the company's mine.

The collision made a total wreck of the building, and the cooking stove in its fall pinned the father to the floor and scattered burning shavings among the walls. Brown (Gwynn) lay on the train in the vicinity of the cottage and rescued the two boys. The James gathered with such rapidity, however, that the rescue of the remaining members of the family was a matter of impossibility. That morning sun shone upon the charred remains of the father and the ashes of his beloved daughter.

The first row of houses was 200 feet from the Locus residence, but it was being diversified. Suddenly the cock attacked the little fellow furiously, knocking him down and galling him about the head. The boy was cut and picked in a horrible manner before he was rescued, and died in convulsions in a few minutes.
