Another big gas well was struck in the Pine Run district, near Freeport last Saturday.

The Cochranton Times says: The amount of butter made at the Cochranton Creamery we believe is greater than that of any other creamery in Northwestern Pennsylvania. Here are the figures for June and July: Amount of butter made in the 52 days, from June 1st to August 1st, 75,000 pounds, an average of every day of the month of 1,500 pounds. The price paid for the cream — 15 cents a gauge — amounts to \$225 a gauge. Seventeen wagons are engaged in delivering cream, at an expense of about \$40 a day. This added to the cost makes \$265 paid in cash every day among the 400 farmers of this section who are the patrons of the creamery.

Five tramps were arrested by the police at Sharon last Sunday night, while engaged in fighting in the boro. Upon searching them, rings, knives and other articles were found in their possession. They are supposed to be the perpetrators of several robberies last week. On Monday they were taken before a Justice of the Peace and after a hearing were sentenced as follows: One to 15 days in the workhouse, Charles Miller, fined four hundred dollars, and ninety days imprisonment; James Burke and James McMahon, same fine as Miller, and four months in prison; Joseph Galvin, fined one hundred dollars and ninety days imprisonment.

James Hoer, the Freeport man charged with criminally assaulting the sixteen year old daughter of James Faugh was sent to jail in default of \$2,500 bail for a hearing on Wednesday. The barn of J. M.
