THE CITIZEN

A Romance of Arizona. One of the most peculiar cases ever litigated in the West is a trial before the supreme court of Arizona, sitting at Phoenix. It is the will contest of John D. Walker's estate. Walker went to that country from Illinois, 35 years ago and took up his residence among the Pima Indians, finally to be admitted into all the tribal secrets, assuming the dress and language of the Indians, and afterward made their war chief.

Through them he learned the locality of the famous mine which he discovered in the West. He was fortunate in the mother of silver. When the country began to be settled he opened it and millions of dollars were taken out in a few years. As a natural consequence his relations with the Indians and the Pima Indians, finally to be admitted into all the tribal secrets, assuming the dress and language of the Indians, and afterward made their war chief.

When Walker became a millionaire he remembered the girl sweetheart of his youth and wrote to some friend asking her whereabouts. Upon learning it he wrote to her offering, after many years, to make good his word and send for her. She accepted the proposition, and he accordingly sent her a check for \$100,000, and seeing their prospective fortune slipping out of their hands, they kidnapped him and took him into California, where they preferred charges of insanity against him and had him confined in a private asylum. His wife escaped, but he had to flee, and his prospective bride and they were married. The brothers were still on his trail and, finding him, took him back to California under the old charges, and a month later he died in the insane asylum at San Bernardino.

The fight over the property, which was worth about \$3,000,000, thus began between the widow and the brothers. She succeeded in getting appointed administratrix, and the case was taken to the supreme court and on some technicality This caused the entire litigation to be gone over again, but about the time the suits were filed in court a third party appeared as claimant. She is no less than Juanna Walker, a half Pima, and the daughter of the original discoverer of the Pima mine. She is 22 years of age, and was reared among the Pimas, after their style and customs.

During the pendency of the first suit some white men in Phoenix who were acquainted with the Pima chief, by his assistance, and explaining the matter to the chief, he forced her to attend the Indian school, where she is now being educated in the English language. Nothing was said about the matter until the case was reversed, when the Pima chief appointed a man for her and formal suit was filed for the entire property. There is no doubt about her being Walker's daughter. All the other Indians, and especially the present chief, say they were acquainted with the Pima chief, and according to the Pima chief and that during the several years they lived together Juanna was born. The revelation came like a thunder clap to the other claimants.
