Harrisburg Notes.

The House Committee on Appropriations is getting down to business on the next six weeks giving hearing to those who desire to press their claims for a share of the State's beneficence.

On Thursday the House dispensed all hope of financial relief from this Congress by rejecting the measure by a vote of 87 to 100.

On Friday the President sent a message to Congress receding that he had not given authority to issue gold bonds.

The French steamer Gasconne, which left Havre Jan. 26, and should have arrived at New York on Feb. 3rd, did not reach the latter place till Monday of this week.

On Thursday the bill of State Water Companies Association, requiring municipalities to purchase the plants of existing corporations either by agreement or condemnation, was passed by the Senate.

The Senate on Tuesday passed the bill of the water companies which was amended to provide for the consolidation of competing water works.

On Friday there was hardly a quorum present in the House and nothing was done.

On Saturday the bill of the water companies was passed by the Senate by a vote of 40 to 0.

On Monday Senator Kennedy practically won his passage for a special committee on the subject of consolidation.
