RESOLUTE DEFEATED SHAMROCK YESTERDAY

New York, July 28.—Resolute, which decisively defeated Shamrock IV in the deciding yacht race in defense of the America's cup yesterday, probably will not run another race, said H. De. B. Parsons, a member of the Race Committee of the New York Yacht Club, today. The defender, which cost thousands of dollars, will be taken to a ship yard at City Island today and then proceed to Bristol, R. I., where she will be dismantled at the Herreschoff yards. Part of her fittings will be stored at City Island.

There will be no special celebration of the victory by the New York Yacht Club. Yachtsmen today highly praised the handling of Resolute by Charles Francis Adams, 2nd, in all the races off Sandy Hook. His generalship in the fluky winds was declared to be nearly faultless.

The Resolute's crew of twenty Norwegians, seven Swedes and Dane—all American citizens—also came in for unstinted praise. Captain Chris Chrisensen, the sailing master, won the last yacht race against the Shamrock 3rd in 1903.

Sir Thomas Lipton, who hid his bitter disappointment behind his cordial congratulations to the Resolute and her crew, saying that the better boat won, will soon leave for a visit to Canada. He will issue another challenger in 1922 and will name the challenger Shamrock V, he said.

The big green sloop will probably be towed up the Hudson within a few days and anchored, to allow visitors a chance to inspect her.

GOVERNOR ORDERS AN INVESTIGATION

Trenton, N. J., July 27.—Gov. Edwards today ordered a sweeping investigation into the management of the Fulton-Wills boxing bout at Newark last night when, it is charged, hundreds who had paid as high as \$15 and \$20 admission were unable to get into the arena because of the inadequate system of handling the crowd.

The show was conducted under the auspices of the International Sporting Club of New York, which had found it impossible to stage a bout in New York because of the law.

MAN CLAIMS TO BE ASTOR'S GRANDSON

Los Angeles, July 27.—Declaring that he is John Armstrong Chaloner, millionaire grandson of John Jacob Astor and that he fought for twenty years to have the New York courts pronounce him sane, a man registered at a hotel as "J. A. Chilton, Compton, Iowa," telegraphed New York newspapers today that he will release a "Big Story" at 3:00 p. m.

One year ago, he said, he had declared a seven year war against the "Lunacy Trust." He intimated that the "Revelations" will deal with the progress of his fight.

WELCOMES TRAIN CARRYING GASOLINE

Los Angeles, July 28.—Gasoline has been so scarce here that today when a train carrying two hundred thousand gallons arrived from Oklahoma it was officially welcomed by Mayor M. P. Snyder and officers of the Automobile Club of Southern California. They met the train at Alhambra, near here and rode back on it.

FIVE THOUSAND MINERS IDLE

Gary Ind., July 28.—As a result of the fuel shortage here 5,000 men here are idle it was reported today. The American Sheet and Tin Mill, one of the largest of its kind, was out of commission. The big Bessemer in the Gary works were operating only intermittently, the plant being seriously crippled. Twelve of the big blast furnaces were closed.

It was announced that in order to continue partial operation the Gary works will hereafter use oil as fuel in many of their departments.


