No Vegetables in Berlin

Describing the condition in the Berlin public markets on June 5, the Vorkwarter says: "The stands were almost empty. The food was almost nonexistent. For a head of cauliflower of the size of a potato, 1.2 marks was charged and for a pound of lima beans 62 marks. Ketchup, tomato sauce and corned beef were scarce and extremely high in price. Fresh chicken meat and wild duck brought over three to four marks."
