THE WATERWORKS. The Committee Submits a Report on What Is Needed.

THE TRINITY RIVER BRIDGE. The Council Vowing Between the Eddy and the King Bridge—The Minutes of Two Meetings Approved.

The city council met last night. Council called to order an minutes of the two previous meetings were read by Secretary Burns, both of which were adopted.

The most important topics discussed were the erection of the bridge over Trinity river, and the report of the waterworks committee, embodying recommendations and ideas from the latter committee in reference to the proposed plant that will be erected sooner or later.

The street and alley committee's report on the proposed erection of the bridge across the Trinity, the bridge to be 150 feet long and 20 feet wide, was adopted.

The council is undecided between the suspension bridge of the Eddy commission and the truss bridge of the city type, but it was the general impression that the latter would be more serviceable and durable.

The finance committee reported on these matters. The report of the city treasurer for the quarter ending June 30, 1911, was returned to the council.

The fireworks committee called attention to the condition of the money paid for the city and recommended that same be repaid. It was also recommended that some action be taken with regard to the money paid for the purchase of the Mineralized rubber company, which has been recommended to last for three years, and has in three months proved of a very inferior quality.

The report of the street and alley committee on the bridge question was here read and discussed. A proposition from George W. Buchanan to erect a bridge over the Trinity, said bridge guaranteed to bear ninety-two pounds to the square foot, the price to be \$100,000, was read and filed.

inch pipe; the mains on Main street being only ten and twelve-inch, and eight-inch mains on Houston street; none at all on Rusk, and only a small amount on Throckmorton street.

These reasons and others of course lead to recommendation that some action be taken if possible to provide for what we believe to be a great public necessity, and the first great step to provide for is good wholesome water.

We have as carefully as possible, with Superintendent Scoble, gone over the city, and have selected the waterworks company. We find the work well done, but will submit to you some recommendations that we believe, with the assistance of a competent civil engineer, to begin immediately upon the work, together with our superintendent, we are fully able to proceed with the work and carry it to a successful completion.

We would recommend that the plans be made a basis of operation until such time as the city engineer, with the water supply, of artesian, be not less than eight million gallons daily in addition to what we now have. We also recommend that the standpipe be erected on the corner of the city hall, and that the necessary changes in pipe lines from original plans be made.

We further recommend that as soon as the matter of location of the new works is settled, our committee be authorized to advertise and receive bids for the work as above outlined, and that every effort be made to secure as close competition as may be possible, and that the contract be awarded to the lowest bidder, provided that the works started in order to be of service at least a part of next year.

We would further recommend that the total outlay for this work not exceed \$200,000, and that the balance of the money of this department will warrant without resort to direct taxation except for increased hydrant rentals, etc.

We fully appreciate the present financial condition of the city, and if, in the future, it is not now, that the people will fully and unanimously endorse the present expenditure if judiciously made a sole view to the interests of our citizens. Respectfully submitted, Geo. M. Niles, Chairman.
