

The last week in July was a very hard week in the cattle trade, and after Tuesday all grass cattle declined rapidly in value. The previous week there were the largest runs of the year at Chicago St. Louis and runs of the year at Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas City. Omaha also had a large supply, and these runs left the trade fairly well filled up. On Monday, July 27, the markets opened up with a slightly better feeling than at the close of the previous week, and on Tuesday the better grades of cattle were 10.10.25 costs, higher. Wednes, cattle were 10 to 15 cents higher. day, however, the 10 to 15 cent advance was lost, and Thursday the market declined 20 cents by the close of the day, and on Friday the market declined 10 to 15 cents, leaving a good large supply of unsold cattle in the yards here and elsewhere, which had to be worked off to a disadvantage, but without any further decline on Saturday. This is the history of St. Louis, and bad

as it is, it is a better showing than was made by the Chicago market. Values at the St. Louis National stockyards were rethe St. Louis National stockyards were re-duced to the lowest point of the year, but nothing could be gained by letting the stock go on to Chicago.
