TEXAS IN TYPE.

TEXAS CROPS AND WEATHER.

Continued drought has prevented thus far the sowing of wheat.

In Foard county on Friday, the 30th ult., there was a norther accompanied with some rain.

It is estimated that 6000 acres of wheat is being sown in Armstrong county.

Stock in San Saba county is reported to be in good condition, notwithstanding the dry weather.

Childrens county farmers say that the ground is in good plowing condition and that the acreage will be nearly double that of last year.

Several hundred bales of cotton have been raised this year in Concho county.

A Wise county farmer, living near Aurora, reports that from a half acre of sweet corn he has supplied his family and sold \$33.

Farmers in Austin county have availed themselves of the good weather to put up a quantity of hay for winter use.

Snyder, Scurry county.—No frost yet. Grass is rich and green, and wheat sowing being pushed.

Hico, Hamilton county.—Cotton is still coming in quite freely. The two crops in town have turned out 2500 bales. The railroad has received for shipment 7000 bales and in the yards there are 1500, making the total to date 8500 bales. About two-thirds of the crop is sold. Two more weeks will entirely wind up the cotton picking.

TERRELL, KAUFMAN COUNTY, TEX., Nov. 2.—Cotton pickers are not so much in demand. The staple is being picked and the fields cleared very fast.

McKinney, Collins county, Texas.—Cotton receipts are falling off.

Groesbeck, Limestone county.—Groesbeck has received 6000 bales of cotton but will get but little more, as the crop is almost entirely picked. The railroad is being shipped here, and is finding ready sale. It is shipped from Collins county mostly. Our farmers made but little corn this year, owing to the continued drought.

TEXAS SCHOOLS AND CHURCHES.

Work on the Baptist college at Abilene is progressing satisfactorily; the roof was completed last week.

Work on a school-house at Ladonia is expected to begin at an early date.

The school at Runge, Karnes county, has on its 127 pupils.

Foard county has four leagues of unsold school land.

LEONARD, FANNIN COUNTY, TEX., Nov. 1.—The election held here yesterday to determine whether a special school tax of 20 cents on the \$100 should be assessed, resulted in a majority vote for the tax.

Hubbard City, Hill county, Nov. 2.—The ten day revival meeting conducted by evangelists "Burnett and Mulkey" closed last night. These men are great workers, and accomplished much good in this section. Nearly 100 conversions were the result of the meeting. They preached to a crowded tent every day and night they were here.

Groesbeck, Limestone county.—The Baptist brethren will commence a series of meetings soon.

TEXAS NEWS AND NOTES.

The artesian well at Cleburne has reached a depth of 600 feet. So far no difficulties in drilling have occurred.

There is to be built a bridge across Wanderers' creek, Greer county, on the road from Chillicothe to Plummer crossing, Red river.

Drilling at a depth of 1700 feet in the well at Abilene, is now through sandstone.

Caving has retarded the progress in drilling an artesian well at Ladonia.

Seventeen miles of new road has been cut out in Karnes county, on the west side of the San Antonio river.

Owing to the scarcity of water in Stephens county stockmen are driving their cattle into Concho county.

The opera-house at Ennis is to be converted into a hotel.

Iowa Park, Wichita county.—Misses Jennie Good and Minnie Smith left last week for an extended visit to Iowa, and Miss Della Dimmitt to Illinois.

The usual Thanksgiving anniversary celebration at Iowa Park, has been arranged for and a big time is anticipated.
