THE MALTERY.

THE MACHINERY BEING MADE AND IT WILL BE BUILT.

Gen. Clark Returns from the East and Brings Good News to the People of Fort Worth.

Gen. F. M. Clark, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, returned home last night after an absence of two weeks in the East and North.

"But it rained every day," he said, "during the week I was in Chicago, Milwaukee and Grand Rapids, the temperature generally being in the 30s and 40s."

"Well," said the general, "the result will be better appreciated as the season goes on. It takes considerably more dickering to locate big machinery than it does to buy a cigar."

"The matter of a public grain elevator was presented by me to the right parties, who will visit our city this winter and arrange for a site, etc. It is extremely important to us to have a public grain elevator erected in this city."

"I have to confess that I was somewhat surprised and mortified to observe the lack of information about Texas. People in the various countries to come to Texas, I told them that we raised cattle in Texas, together with some corn and cotton; but they were unaware of the fact that we had large quantities of wheat, sorghum, and other crops."

"What is needed is for Fort Worth to expend about \$10,000 and send some good man pushing a man who will not have to be urged to make any money, but who will go forward and make himself known and heard."

"I asked him when I met him on this trip if he had fully concluded to come to Fort Worth and establish the maltery, and for an answer he took me to the machine shops where the machinery for this plant was then being made."
