ARE MARRIED AT LAST.

LEG BROKEN BY A FALL IN A
PARLOR—ON TRIAL FOR COM-
PLICITY IN A MURDER.

Waco Must Put Up to Secure Add
Ran College—Trial of Steen
Morris' Case Postponed.

Waco, Tex., Oct. 8.—(Special).—B. G.
Frazier of Hill county asked permis-
sion of Mr. Payne, a neighbor, to marry
his daughter two weeks ago. Mr.
Payne refused, whereupon the young
lovers eloped. They went to Lorena,
McLennan county, and from there they
went into the country a few miles
and the man hired to Mr. H. L. Straw-
burn to pick cotton. They had never
been married, but told Mr. Strawburn
they were married in Waco. He ac-
cepted the story as true until yester-
day, when he became suspicious and
came to Waco and made inquiry into
the matter. He was informed that no
marriage license had been issued to
the parties, whereupon he procured
one and returned to his home and told
the couple they would be compelled to
marry. They offered no resistance and
the wedding took place.

ADD RAN COLLEGE.

Waco Must Work Rapidly to Secure
the Institution.

Waco, Tex., Oct. 8.—(Special).—Dr.
J. W. Lawler of Galveston, chancellor
of Add-Ran university, was in the city
today and talked to the Gazette repre-
sentative concerning the removal of
Add-Ran university from Thorp
Springs to Waco. He said that other
cities had made propositions to the
faculty of that institution to secure
Add-Ran and that if Waco doesn't do
something before October 18 it will
be too late. Fort Worth offered a
\$50,000 bonus three years ago for a
removal of the university to that place
and Dr. Lawler thinks she will renew
her proposition.

ON TRIAL.

R. V. T. Black Charged With Com-
plicity in a Murder.

Waco, Tex., Oct. 8.—(Special).—R. V.
T. Black is on trial in Judge Scott's
court here today. On the 12th day of
December, 1894, Mr. Black became in-
volved in a difficulty with Mr. Fred,
a merchant of Edgfield, an addition to
Waco, and his son, Lon Black, shot
Mr. Fred. The wounded man died next
day. The defendant claims he was ac-
cused by Fred, who had in his hand
an ugly knife, when his son fired, with
the above result.

R. V. T. Black is to answer to the

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 8.—(Special).—The
