THANKSGIVING DAY HELPS THE COTTON MAKER. The price of the staple in New York closes at a light advance.

New York, Nov. 27.—The cotton market opened quiet and unchanged; sold at 4 points on disappointing cables, but rallied on indications of small receipts and covering in anticipation of the holiday tomorrow.

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DEMAND WAS GOOD.

CHICAGO LIVE STOCK MARKET IN NORMAL CONDITION. The Storm Has Subsided and Cattle and Hogs Are Selling at the Old Prices.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 27.—Common to strictly native prime dressed beef and shipping steers were in demand at \$13.00-13.50; bulk of sales, \$12.50-13.00. Butchers' and cannery's stuff was in good demand at ruling prices. Fat cows at \$10.00-10.50, medium grades at \$10.00-10.50; canning lots, \$10.00-10.50; not many selling lower than \$10.00. Bulls sold at \$10.00-10.50, and calves at \$10.00-10.50. Stockers and feeders were rather scarce and in fair demand at straggler prices, with sales at \$10.00-10.50. The few Texas and rangers received were sold at steady prices.

Trade in hogs started off actively at steady prices, but the market became weaker after most of the good hogs were disposed of. Choice ones were within the narrow range of 25c, but the choice dressed sold at \$10.00-10.50, and middle lots sold at about the same prices, and pigs were active and firm at \$10.00-10.50 for good to choice lots. A year ago hogs sold at \$10.00-10.50, and three years ago at \$10.00-10.50. There was a fair demand at steady prices. Inferior to good sheep saleable at \$1.50-2.00, and very much nominal at \$1.50-2.00. Western sheep were in demand at \$1.50-2.00, for ordinary to choice and lambs were sold at \$1.00-1.50 for common to choice.

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A GANG OF THEM.

LEWIS ADMITS EXISTENCE OF A GANG OF HORSE THIEVES. Promises to Disclose the Names of All of Them—Stole the Justice's Harness.

John Lewis, alias John Jackson, who was brought to this city yesterday by the police, was turned over to the county authorities yesterday morning. He is wanted on a charge of stealing a horse from Mr. Lashin some week ago. Lewis was arraigned in Judge Wright's court yesterday and made some sensational disclosures. He admitted his guilt and further said that that was not the only horse he had stolen. He stated that there was a gang of five negroes, he being one of them, who made it a business to steal horses, harness or anything else they could get. According to his statement, this gang had already stolen five horses. Some time ago Judge Wright, the justice who was trying him, lost a brand-new \$18 set of harness. It was in the evening of the 27th of October, and he was told that it was stolen by a gang of five negroes. He promised that he would tell the names of his accomplices, though he did not do so yesterday.

They scattered the huns. The Result of the Recent Overhauling by the Police. The police have been scouring the city for more than a week for suspicious characters, with the result that a number have been placed behind the bars of the city calaboose, while many professional huns and deal boys have disappeared from the city. According to the report of the tramp nuisance on the Fourth Street has been considerably abated, and, altogether, the city is much better off than it was before the recent investigation of the police on that subject. It has increased revenues. The waterworks department is now feeling the effects of the recent thorough inspection of premises throughout the city and the consequent increase in receipts for water. It is some protest by people who labored under the misapprehension that there had been a raise in rates, but the matter is getting to be generally understood, and people are paying now without complaint in most cases where an increase has been made in their water tax with a beneficial result to the city.
