CANE AND BEET SUGAR.

New Plants for Which Will Soon Find Their Way into Texas.

New Orleans, January 19, 1897.—That numerous beet sugar plants will soon find their way into Texas, such as are now being in Illinois, California, Nebraska, Utah, Arizona, Wisconsin and New Mexico, is what a reliable source of information has just received from the beet sugar industry in the very heart of the continent.

The construction of these plants will require the services of a skilled contractor and engineer, and the beet sugar industry in this country is now being organized to order and when Texas comes to construct sugar plants she may look to the west coast and not find a more competent contractor than the one now in New Orleans in the person of WILLIAM R. TAYLOR. In a lengthy sketch published in the New Orleans Journal of Finance and Commerce, that journal says:

He has the reputation of being one of the best sugar engineers in the State, and his experience, not only as a foundryman and machinery builder, but as a sugar house manager, enables him to give good advice to those contemplating additions to or alterations in their sugar houses.
