The attorney general has begun an inquiry and as soon as he secures the information he desires he will file suit to annul the charter of the trust and force it out of business.

He will also institute criminal proceedings against the officers of the trust, if in his investigation he finds sufficient information on which to base indictments.

The ice trust has advanced prices over 300 per cent in the past twelve months and ice has now reached a figure out of reach of the poor.

The retail price today was quoted at 39 cents per 100 pounds. One year ago it sold for 15 cents per 100.

The retail dealers have organized two companies to establish independent factories, but some weeks ago they were broken up.

In the meantime the New Orleans dealers have purchased a factory at Lake Charles, La., for its entire product outside of its local demand, and they are negotiating with other factories for additional supplies.

The trust has threatened to sue for damages if the state attempts to regulate the price of crushing the Louisiana factory, and this threat is deterring congressmen at Washington.
