A DAY IN THE COURTS.

United States Officers Given Quarters in the New Court House.

THE WALKER SUIT STILL ON TRIAL.

Case of B. F. Harless vs. L. S. Brady Was Finished and Taken Under Adjudication by Judge Wilson.

At the session of the county commissioners yesterday morning a communication was received from Mr. C. Dart, clerk of the United States court at Galveston, asking for quarters for certain Federal officials in the new county court house in this city. The officers named as desiring office rooms were the clerk of the court and the marshal.

No law provision has been made for the accommodation of the court. The making of such provisions is usually a part of the duties of the marshal, but the president has not yet appointed such an officer for the district and Mr. Dart is endeavoring to make the arrangements in ample time for the first session of the new court. He asked that the offices be turned over to the government not later than June 25, and the commissioners have ordered Sheriff Anderson to make the delivery to the Federal officials named at the time specified. It now only remains to secure a comfortable court room, pending the erection of a new and commodious Federal building.

The case of B. F. Harless vs. L. S. Brady, which was a case in trespass to try title and for damages was finished and taken under adjudication by Judge Wilson.

No law provision has been made for the accommodation of the court. THE GUADALUPE AT SEGUIN.

Water Power is to Be Fully Developed for Manufacturing Purposes.

Seguin, Texas, May 14.—Among the enterprises in view and in the course of construction in Seguin of more than ordinary note is the development of the water power at the site of the Seguin flouring mills near the old Irskine ferry. This company, composed of J. T. Holmes, Walter and Eugene Nolte and Otto Trell, is sparing no expense in carrying into execution this work in a manner that will mean much to the future of Seguin and Guadalupe county.

There is a natural dam of ten feet on the Guadalupe river at the company's site, and it is adding three feet to this dam. With the three powerful turbine wheels of the Seguin mill and gas, so much will have for other enterprises 100 horse power. This company claims it can let at a profit lower rates than any other company of operating machinery by the use of oil or kerosene.

It was first the intention of this company to put in a cotton factory, and it still has in view that object at some future date, but is now awaiting the success of the cotton factory. The labor question in the establishment of cotton factories has been serious one in Texas. Through Colonel James F. Miller, one of the leading stockholders in the Seguin cotton factory, who was in this city a few days ago, says that they are experiencing no trouble on this score. This being the case, will probably hasten the establishment of other enterprises here.

The original dam, having been made by the process of nature, will last always and is thoroughly protected from the fingers of men. The turbine wheels, which are set in a race in the bend of the river, will have lower gates built and will be protected absolutely from material damage by men.

The cotton compress, the ice factory, the flouring mill, the American Cotton company's round bale plant and other enterprises previously mentioned by The Post correspondent have all either been completed or are in the course of construction, and work on the brewery will be begun within the next ninety days. About a large amount of machinery has been contracted for.
