REQUEST IS REJECTED. Street Car Men Will Not Grant the Extension of Time.

WILL OPERATE THE CARS UNTIL FURTHER ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE.

At a Meeting of the Houston Labor Council This Morning at Eleven O'clock the Car Men Will Be Represented.

Nothing new developed yesterday in the controversy between the Houston Electric Railway company and its employees. The called meeting of the union to consider the request of Manager Payne for two weeks' time in which to consider the proposal of the men began last night at 12:30 o'clock.

The secretary was then instructed to inform the street railway company of this action, and further to state that if the company had a reasonable proposition to offer the men would be glad to receive it.

Demands of the Men.

Following is an exact copy of the contract demanded by the men: This memorandum of agreement made and entered into this day of November, 1902, by and between the Houston Electric Railway company and local division No. 84 of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees of America, witnesses: Section 1. That the Houston Electric Railway company, through their properly accredited officers, will treat with the employees through the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees of America, local division No. 84, of Houston, Texas, through their properly accredited officers and consultants.

The Company's Offer.

Following is the form in which the company's offer was presented: Average—First three months, 17.6 cents; second, 19.8 cents; third, 20.9 cents. Percentage increase with good service, 10 per cent.
