NEW TEAM LOOKS GOOD

Lost to Northampton, 3 to 2, but Played Better Ball for Most Part

BREAK IN EIGHTH GAVE CHAMPS GAME

Until Then Only One Visitor Had Reached a Base off O'Connor—But One Man of Old Team Now in Line-up—Good Work by Hammond.

With only one man playing in the lineup of those who represented Brattleboro during the first two weeks of the season, the home team forced the Northampton champs to extend every effort to beat them yesterday at the island, but the visitors did it by a score of 3 to 2. Three bunched singles, an error in right field and a sacrifice fly gave them three runs and the game.

What resembled poor judgment in base running and coaching may have cost Brattleboro more than enough runs to have won in the sixth and seventh innings. As it was the home team fought to the last ditch. As it now stands the team "looks good." There was a brand new battery and new men at second and short and each one of them gave a good account of himself.

So did the older players, especially Hammond in center, who played his own field and half of the others.

The game early gave evidence of developing into a pitchers' battle between O'Connor, our new slab artist, and Paul, the giant of the visitors. Backed by fine fielding, O'Connor went along smoothly with only one man having reached a base until one was out in the eighth. Then the break came.

Brattleboro had made one run in the fifth and narrowly escaped adding to that lone tally in both the sixth and seventh innings, men being thrown out at the plate in each of those innings by perfect throwing by Swasey on easy chances, for neither of the men had a ghost of a chance to score, barring a poor throw or a fumble by the catcher, and Francis was not making many of those.

To return to the break of the game, McCreehan made a pretty catch of a low fly off Robarge's bat in the eighth. King dumped a single in short right, Dike playing a very deep field. Parle did identically the same thing and King made third. Francis lifted a short fly that Dike ran desperately for and fell as he almost reached it, King scoring. Dike, for some unknown reason, threw to second instead of throwing to the plate and the throw went wild. Parle scoring and Francis taking third. With Paul at bat Jennings was sent to warm up and Paul fled to Hammond in deep center, Francis beating the throw to the plate. Swasey singled over Mulvey and took second on a wild pitch, but Foran grounded to Yelle. A single by Goodrich in the ninth with one out was the only other hit off O'Connor.

Hammond reached third in the first inning on his single, his steal and Paul's wild throw to catch him napping, but Solomon and Mulvey could not bring him in. The home team went out in order in the next three innings.

With two down in the fifth, Brattleboro's favorite time for scoring, Sullivan drove the second single made off Paul to right. Whalen dropped a ball home from second. The throw from left was fast and true and the distance short and Whalen was an easy out.

Our second run came in the eighth after the Meadow Larks had gathered their three runs. Paul had begged to stay in and Burns had finally let him. Hammond went out, King to Goodrich. Solomon allowed himself to be hit by a slow one, and in spite of the protests of Northampton went to first. Mulvey ripped a hard single to right that Robarge, finding that he could not catch it, attempted to block and the ball rolled by him, Solomon scoring and Mulvey making third. Yelle tapped a short fly to left and with not one chance in a hundred to score, Mulvey was sent home, Swasey and Francis completing an easy double play.

We played our last card in the ninth. Hammond went out gracefully from Burns to Goodrich. Sullivan worked a pass and Carpenter, who had been on the coaching line all the afternoon, was sent to bat for Whalen. He had two strikes and three balls, and Jennings, who had gone to pitch after Mulvey

had singled in the eighth, grooved the next one. Carpenter tapped it to the pitcher, who tossed to Parle and the second baseman with Goodrich completed a double play and the 15th straight defeat for Brattleboro. The figures of this game do not look so badly as some have:
