

NEW TARIFF RETALIATORY

Wheat and Wheat Flour Not to Be Admitted Free from Many Countries

IMPORTANT RULING BY T REASURY OFFICIAL

Must Admit Our Products Free if They Ship Here Without a Duty—Notices Sent to the Customs Collectors of the Country.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Wheat and flour will not be admitted free to the United States from the countries which decline to admit free of duty similar products from the United States. This ruling was made by the Assistant Secretary Hamlin of the treasury department, who construes the new tariff law as presenting this decision. The customs collectors have been advised that the only countries now admitting American wheat and flour without duty are Great Britain, Finland and the Netherlands.

THAW GETS MORE TIME

Will Have Until Tuesday to Fight Against Extradition.

ROCHESTER, N. H., Oct. 28.—Gov. Folger, after hearing both sides yesterday, granted the request of Harry K. Thaw for a further continuance in the extradition proceedings, setting Nov. 4 as the final date on which his lawyers may file a supplementary brief bearing on the conspiracy indictment returned against their client by the New York county grand jury. A continuance of two weeks had been requested.

William Travers Jerome, special deputy attorney-general of New York, who opposed the delay, will be allowed two days to make answer after the brief has been filed. Probably 3,000 persons gathered at the city hall to see Thaw when he arrived with his guardians from Concord and as many as could crowded into the room where the hearing was held. It was a Thaw crowd and when former Gov. Stone of Pennsylvania, who appeared for Thaw, declared that the sentiment of the people of New York and New Hampshire is that his client had been punished sufficiently already, there was a demonstration of approval so noisy that the governor ordered the room cleared. Officers attempted to carry out the order, but made little headway and the spectators remained to the end.

OLYMPIC COMMITTEE TO MEET IN JULY

United States Athletes Could Not Attend Earlier—Events for 1916 Will Be Decided Upon.

BERLIN, Oct. 28.—The principal events of the Olympic games to be held here in 1916 are to be decided between July 1 and 10, according to an announcement made by the German Olympic committee. The June dates contemplated earlier were abandoned by the committee at the instance of the United States, which objected because the college athletes from that country would be unable to attend at that time of year.

The football and hockey championships are to be contested on May 29 and June 5, respectively, and the rowing on Aug. 12. The dates for the sailing, golf, etc., have not yet been fixed.

The committee has not yet decided to what extent supplementary sports are to figure in the program of the Olympic games.
