GERMANY IS ON PROBATION

Wilson Will Not Close Issue Before Acts Conform to Promise

MUST DEMONSTRATE ACTUAL GOOD FAITH

Until There Has Been a Sufficient Lapse of Time to Show That Germany's Pledges Mean Something U. S. Will Not Alter Attitude.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—It is becoming more and more apparent that President Wilson is determined to maintain an uncompromising attitude toward Germany until he is fully satisfied that the imperial government has actually removed the submarine menace to non-combatants from the high seas.

lapse of time to demonstrate that Germany has really effected this pledge the attitude of the United States will remain about as it has been for the past month toward the Imperial government.

No effort is, apparently, going to be made to placate the German government or to re-establish a mutual feeling of confidence and good will. This compromising policy was adopted by Mr. Bryan after the Lusitania disaster, it is explained, and the result proved far from satisfactory. Secretary Lansing therefore is resolved to have Germany prove as well as declare its good faith before he changes his present policy.

BODY OF GILLEGAN MAY BE EXHUMED

New Turn Given to Poison Inquiry at Old Folks' Home in Connecticut Town.

WINDSOR LOCKS, Conn., May 13.—Reports that the state police will exhumate from the cemetery here the body of Michael W. Giligan, second and last husband of Mrs. Amy E. Archer Giligan, arrested for the murder of an inmate of her old folks' home at Windsor, have given a new and startling turn to the inquiry into what went on at the home. The authorities say they have found poison in exhumed bodies of inmates.

There seems to be a discrepancy in the records covering two months during which time the whereabouts of Giligan's body is in doubt. The town clerk's records in Windsor show that Frank P. Smith, the undertaker whom State's Attorney Aleora has questioned, certified on Feb. 20, 1914, that Giligan was buried in the cemetery here. The town clerk's records in Windsor Locks say, however, that it was not until April 18, 1914, that Mrs. Giligan's husband's body was buried.
