EUROPEAN WAR SITUATION

Allied Powers Have Found What May Prove the Key to the Riddle of the Balkans, Rumania

After two years of one of the most strenuous diplomatic battles that have ever been waged, the representatives of the allied powers have finally found what may prove the key to the riddle of the Balkans—Rumania.

All this time Rumania has been rife as to the Rumanian attitude. Her commercial treaties with Germany and Austria have served only to increase the mysterious atmosphere with which her attitude was surrounded.

These are a few of the aspects of the Rumanian intervention. Rumania's next move will be watched with an interest not accorded any other move since the earliest days of the war.

Germany has no more men than she needs for the defense of the front she is at present holding. All along this front, in France, in Russia, before Saloniki she is under terrific pressure from the allied armies.

Bulgaria is holding both wings of the army of defense at Saloniki, and is carrying on an offensive campaign against Greece for the possession of the port of Kavala and the immediate territory. For this Bulgaria has about 400,000 men.

There are also two cases of paralysis in the family of H. A. Hulet at Arlington, making a total of four. Two sons of Mr. Hulet, 11 and 13 years of age, are ill with the disease.

SUIT FOR \$160,000,000.

Five Stockholders of New Haven Road Want Restitution.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Former officers, directors and counsel of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad were made defendants yesterday in a liability and restitution suit for more than \$160,000,000, filed in the United States district court by five Massachusetts stockholders of the road.

RAILWAY SUPPLIES EXPORTS.

Total Value in Last Fiscal Year Was \$75,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Railway materials and equipment valued at \$75,000,000 were exported from the United States in the last fiscal year, according to figures compiled by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, department of commerce.

FATAL RIOTS IN DRESDEN.

More Than 100 Reported Slain in Liebknecht Protest.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Reports have reached The Hague, says the correspondent there of the Central News, that 85 civilians, 22 soldiers, and four policemen were killed in Dresden last week. The disorders are said to have been brought on by a demonstration against the imposition of an increased sentence on Dr. Karl Liebknecht as a result of his appeal from the finding of the military court.

SUFFRAGETTES ELECT.

Dr. Grace Sherwood President of State Association.

ST. ALBANS, Aug. 31.—The annual meeting of the Vermont Equal Suffrage association opened here yesterday afternoon with a representative attendance of members.

Honorary president, Mrs. Julia A. Pierce of Rochester; president, Dr. Grace Sherwood of St. Albans; vice president, first congressional district, Mrs. H. S. Howard of Burlington; vice president, second congressional district, Mrs. W. L. Bryant of Springfield; treasurer, Mrs. Lucas Blanchard of Montpelier; recording secretary, Miss J. O'Connell of Burlington; corresponding secretary, Miss Emilia Houghton of St. Albans; auditor, Mrs. Francis P. Wyman of Manchester Center.

Dr. Sherwood was commissioned delegate to the national convention to be held at Atlantic City, N. J. As president of the association, Dr. Sherwood will appoint two other delegates. Last evening a reception was held at Dr. Sherwood's home. An important business meeting today will close the session.

ELLIOTT ISSUES STATEMENT.

Strike Order Affects Passenger as Well as Freight Service.

WASHINGTON, August 31.—President Elliott of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad, issued a statement in which he said, touching on President Wilson's address to congress: "Those who have not followed the subject carefully, and do not understand its complexity, may assume from the President's language that a strike order will have an effect upon passenger train service. This is not the case, and included in the order to strike are all men in passenger train service who are members of the various brotherhoods."

Mr. Elliott quoted part of the instructions issued to the men with the strike order and underlined this sentence in those instructions: "So far as your legal right to strike is concerned there is no difference between a mail train and a freight train."

UNORGANIZED MEN PROTEST.

Their Spokesman Opposes 8-Hour Law in Letter to President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Robert T. Fraser, representing unorganized railroad employes of the country, yesterday sent to President Wilson a letter protesting against Mr. Wilson's recommendation to congress that a law be passed for an eight-hour basic day for railroad employes actually engaged in the work of operating trains in interstate transportation.

STRIKE AT GREENFIELD.

175 Men Left the Wiley & Russell Factory Yesterday.

GREENFIELD, Mass., Aug. 31.—The Greenfield Machinists' union called a strike at the Wiley & Russell factory yesterday afternoon and 175 men left their work after an unsuccessful demand for an eight-hour day with 10 hours' pay, the reinstatement of the strikers and their sympathizers at the F. E. Wells & Son company plant, the abolition of charges for small tools, the recognition of shop committees, extra pay for overtime, the re-arrangement of piece work prices and the remedying of alleged unsanitary conditions.

IRISH NEWSPAPERS SEIZED.

Gen. Maxwell Acts on Charge of Provoking Disaffection.

DUBLIN, August 31.—Police and soldiers have seized the machinery and plant in Tralee, where the newspapers, New Banner, Kerryman and Liberator were published.
