15,000 ORDERED BACK FROM BORDER

Six Thousand Coast Artillerymen Also to Return to Home Stations

PERSHING TROOPS TO BE WITHDRAWN

If Transportation Facilities Remain Undisturbed the War Department Intends to Order Home More Regiments.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. — Orders for the return to their state mobilization camps of 15,000 national guardsmen now on the Mexican border were issued last night by the war department. General Funston was directed to return three regiments from New York, two from New Jersey, two from Illinois, two from Missouri and one each from California, Oregon, Washington and Louisiana.

Secretary Baker announced the order after a conference with President Wilson at the White House. Earlier in the day the department had ordered to their home stations 6,000 regular coast artillerymen who have been serving as infantry on the border.

The secretary's statement said that in a few days, if transportation facilities remain undisturbed, the department intends to order home more regiments.

Regiments to be sent home were not designated by number and it is understood that their selection is left to Gen. Funston.

The policy now is to give all of the state troops called into the federal service opportunity to see service on war footing along the international line.

Withdrawal of Gen. Pershing's expedition in Mexico, which is expected to follow soon after the meeting of the Mexican-American joint commission at Portsmouth, N. H., probably will lead to the early return home of all the guardsmen.
