MILDRED BREWSTER SEEKING A RELEASE

Woman Who Killed Anna Wheeler at Montpelier in 1897 Given a Hearing Yesterday.

MONTPELIER, Oct. 27. — A hearing was begun before Judge Frank L. Fish in Washington county court yesterday afternoon on the petition of the supervisors of the state hospital for the insane at Waterbury for the discharge or parole of Mildred Brewster, who shot and killed Annie Wheeler in this city May 30, 1897, and who was found guilty by a jury the following year on the grounds of insanity.

Dr. Fred E. Steele, sr., and Dr. R. M. Polton, supervisors, testified that in their opinion Miss Brewster was sane and would not be dangerous to society if allowed her liberty.

New York Woman's Clinic Interrupted by Woman Detective.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27. — Mrs. Margaret Sanger, the birth-control advocate, and her assistant, Miss Fannie Mindell, were arrested here yesterday on warrants charging them with imparting information prohibited by law at a birth-control clinic, said to be the first institution in the United States, which it is alleged they were conducting in the congested Brooklyn section of Brooklyn. A woman detective posed as a woman seeking information at the alleged clinic, where she found 20 other women waiting in an outer office. Mrs. Sanger denounced the detective when the latter revealed her identity, and it was necessary for men officers to carry Mrs. Sanger to a police wagon.

History of the National Banking System

THE NATIONAL BANKING ACT The outstanding feature of the Act passed by Congress in 1865 was the fact that it provided, not for a "United States Bank," but for many "National Banks," each of which should resemble to some extent the First and Second United States Banks.

Chase's scheme did not sell many bonds during the war in spite of its requiring National Banks to deposit bonds to cover their circulating notes and to deposit a certain amount even though they had no circulation. For it took too long to get the system to working. But from 1865 to 1913 it furnished a sound though not a perfect banking system.
