IMPORTANT TO SHIP-BUILDERS,
The United States local inspectors of steam vessels have been notified by Supervising Inspector General James A. Dumont, of the Treasury Department, that hereafter all boilers built for marine purposes shall be required to have the rivet holes in the shell, heads, steam and mud drums and all other parts of the boiler (excepting for longitudinal and circumferential scams in flues for same, 20 inches outside diameter and under), fairly drilled instead of punched. Boilers, to be entitled to the 20 per cent, additional pressure allowed by law, must have the longitudinal laps of their cylindrical parts double riveted. double riveted.

SOUTHERN SHIP-YARDS COMET.

Two large steamers are to be built by the Maryland Steel Company, Baltimore, for the Beston Towboat Company, instead of one, as announced last week. Work will commence on both at come and they will be ready for delivery about October. They will meet the requirements of the American Shipmasters Rules for a 17-year rating. The dimensions of the boats will be:

Length between perpendiculars, 324 feet; length over all, about 345 feet; beam moulded, 47 feet; depth moulded, 25 feet. No wood will be used in their construction except where actually necessary. The engines are to be of the inverted, direct-acting, triple expansion type, with cylinders 21, 25 and 56 inches in diameter. While these steamers are being constructed for the coal carrying trade, it is likely that they will be used in general freighting between United States ports and Cuba and Porto Rico—New York Marine Journal.
