HOFFMAN V. KRAMER. Supreme Court of North Carolina, December 20, 1898.

A FACTOR CANNOT PASS TITLE TO HIS CONSIGNOR'S MERCHANDISE BY A TRANSFER IN PAYMENT OF, OR AS SECURITY FOR, HIS OWN ANTECEDENT DEBT.

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THE EIGHT HOUR LAW

A Strong Delegation Will Go to Washington.

Meeting Held at Board of Trade Last Night to Arrange For Visiting Washington—Will Leave Wednesday Afternoon.

A delegation of twenty-five well known citizens are expected to leave for Washington Wednesday evening to urge Congress to pass the bill intended to make eight hours a day's work on government ships being built at private yards.

A joint meeting of all committees appointed in connection with this matter was held at the Board of Trade last night.

There were representatives present from the following organizations: Norfolk City Council, Portsmouth City Council, Norfolk Board of Trade, Portsmouth Chamber of Commerce, Central Labor Union, mechanics' association and workmen of navy-yard.

A STRONG DELEGATION NEEDED. The necessity of taking a strong delegation to Washington, thoroughly prepared to present the Norfolk side of the question, was discussed at considerable length.

CALIFORNIA WILL CO-OPERATE. Mr. J. D. Reed, of Portsmouth, moved that the secretary be instructed to request the California delegation in Congress to give the Norfolk proposition their support.

CONGRESSMAN INVITED. Mr. E. Thompson suggested that Col. Fenton Day could be of service to the committee in Washington, and moved that he be invited to go with the committee.

CHIEF ENGINEER SMITH ENDORSED. Mr. King moved that the secretary be instructed to prepare a resolution endorsing the course of Chief Engineer Smith, of the Norfolk navy yard, and that the department at Washington be urged to continue him at Norfolk.

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THE TWENTIETH CENTURY GATHERINGS OF METHODISTS TO PROMOTE EDUCATIONAL OFFERING.

In obedience to address of the bishops of the M. E. Church, South, issued upon the unanimous vote of the General Conference, held in Baltimore, Md., in May, 1898, in favor of raising a Twentieth Century Educational Fund to commemorate the signal blessings of God upon the church during the past one hundred years, the move to raise \$150,000 as the thank offering of the church on the morning of the new century, will be begun in this city on next Thursday. That evening at 8 o'clock Bishop Galloway will hold a conference with all of the official members and ministers of the three districts mentioned at Epworth Church, when he will deliver an address. The public is cordially invited to attend this meeting.

Friday, the 24th instant, Bishop Galloway will address a mass meeting in the interests of the movement at the M. E. Church, South, Newport News.

On Sunday, the 26th instant, at 11 o'clock a. m., the Bishop will preach at Monumental Church, Portsmouth.

Sunday evening, the 26th, at 7:30 o'clock, he will preach at Epworth Church, in this city.
