COMING TO NORFOLK

The Association of Railway Telegraph Superintendents.

TO CONVENE IN NORFOLK

Prefer This City to Wilmington-The Members Will Reach Here Tomorrow Morning on a Special Train, Conclude Their Session at the Monticello Hotel - Will Leave To-morrow Night For Their Homes.

Considerable interest was manifested in Norfolk on Monday night in the arrival here of a large number of noted telegraphers and electricians, including Thomas A. Edison. Their arrival was the signal for an informal levee at the Monticello Hotel, where they stopped for the night, Mr. Edison coming in for the greater share of attention.

On Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock the large party boarded a special train on the Seaboard Air Line for Wilmington, N. C. It was the intention, and according to the official itinerary, to hold their sessions at Wilmington, returning to Norfolk on Saturday to depart from here to their homes.

Their brief stay in Norfolk was, however, so satisfactory that the members of the association decided to adjourn their sessions from Wilmington to this city, in the parlors of the Monticello. In accordance with this decision arrangements have been made to receive them back to-morrow.

The members of the association will leave Wilmington to-night on a special Seaboard Air Line train, reaching Portsmouth to-morrow (Friday) morning at 6:30 o'clock.

The remaining session will be held at the Monticello to-morrow from 10 a. m. to 2:30 p. m. The remaining portion of their stay in Norfolk will probably be made pleasant by carriage rides around Norfolk and its beautiful and rapidly growing suburbs, with perhaps short railway trips to Virginia Beach and other places of interest nearby, or a trip around the harbor.

It is probable that many of our citizens who did not see Mr. Edison during his brief stay here on Monday night and Tuesday morning will call on him and pay their respects to the great inventor, whose creations and discoveries have done so much to revolutionize modern life.

FUNERAL OF DR. SLEDD.

AN IMPRESSIVE OCCASION-BODY TAKEN TO POWHATAN.

The funeral services over the body of Rev. Dr. R. N. Sledd were held in Main-Street Methodist Church, Danville, at 6 o'clock Tuesday evening. In the presence of an assemblage that crowded the building. The occasion was most solemn and impressive. The rostrum, walls, furniture, and accessories were draped in black. Sable cloth covered the chancel rail, and heavy drapery depended from the back of the vacant chair which the deceased was wont to occupy. The body, enclosed in a handsome cloth-covered casket, rested before the chancel rail, behind which, on tables, were massed in beautiful and imposing array a fragrant collection of pure white and pink flowers. Bishop J. C. Granbery, who officiated; Rev. Paul Whitehead, D. D., presiding elder of Lynchburg District; Rev. W. V. Tudor, D. D., pastor of Centenary Church, Richmond; Rev. James Cannon, of Blackstone; Rev. J. Lafferty, D. D., of Richmond; Rev. H. C. Cheatham, of Martinsville; Rev. P. M. Edwards, of South Boston; Rev. W. P. Wright, presiding elder; J. and T. Whitley, of Hampton, were visiting ministers, who occupied seats in the rostrum. The invocation was by Bishop Granbery; Dr. Tudor read the first lesson, selecting the nineteenth Psalm; Dr. Whitehead read the second lesson, consisting of a passage from the fifteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians, beginning at the twentieth verse, and all three of the divines afterwards paid exalted tributes to the memory of Dr. Sledd. All the resident ministers of Danville attended the services.

At 1 o'clock at night the remains were taken to Powhatan county, the funeral party, consisting of relatives and a committee from the church, leaving over the Richmond and Danville railway. The interment was made in the family burying-ground yesterday.

A convincing testimonial of the great admiration and love entertained for the deceased minister by members of all denominations was the attendance at the funeral of every minister in the city, together with a large representation of the congregations of each.

PRESENTS FROM SPAIN.

CITIZEN OF NORFOLK REMEMBERED BY SPANISH NAVAL OFFICERS.

Mr. Arthur C. Humphreys, who was the Spanish vice consul in Norfolk before the declaration of war upon Spain by this country, has received from Admiral Cervera and Captain Concas, of the Spanish navy, likenesses of themselves, encased in pretty frames made in Spain.

Mr. Humphreys has also a handsome Spanish Admiral's flag made by the wife and daughter of Captain Concas at their home, in Barcelona. The flag is made of silk and is just half the size of the one on Admiral Cervera's flagship. Captain Concas, it will be remembered, was brought to Norfolk as a prisoner. He was commander of the flagship of Admiral Cervera, the

María Teresa. He was a frequent visitor at the office of Mr. Humphreys while here, while Admiral Cervera and his son, Lieutenant Angel Cervera, were guests of Mr. Humphreys for a short time while here from Annapolis.

OFFICER TYSON'S TRIAL.

IT IS SET FOR TO-DAY, BUT WILL LIKELY BE POSTPONED.

The trial of Substitute Officer James G. Tyson for shooting Mr. J. Wilbur Stakes, is set for this morning before Justice Tomlin, but it is not believed Tyson will be able to appear in court. While Stakes is improving, it is not probable that he will be able to appear in court for some time yet.

If Tyson does not appear in court to-day Justice Tomlin will recommit him, setting the trial ten days hence. The present condition of Tyson mentally does not appear to have improved to any appreciable extent. Stakes is slowly improving. He was able yesterday to sit up in bed for a short time. His condition now gives room for hope of his recovery.

A HANDSOME RESIDENCE.

TO BE ERECTED BY MR. H. L. PAGE.

Mr. H. L. Page has had plans prepared for a handsome new residence that he will erect for his own use at Ribbie Place, on Mary's avenue, at a cost of about \$10,000.

The structure will be three stories in height, with double basement, and will be in the colonial style, with broad verandas at front and back. It will be finished inside in quartered oak and will have all modern improvements.

The first floor will be devoted to parlor, library, dining-room, billiard room and kitchen. The cellar will be equipped with furnace, laundry, store rooms, etc.

There will be seven chambers on the third floor.

Bids are now being received and Mr. Page expects to break ground for the structure by the 1st of June. It will stand in the centre of seven choice lots, with a frontage of 175 feet on Mary's avenue, and will be a handsome addition to Norfolk's list of fine residences.

An Illusion at Sea.

On May 14th, in latitude 38 degrees 56 minutes, longitude 76 degrees, what appeared to be a boat at sea with people in it was seen by those on board the Norwegian steamer Rauma, which arrived at Baltimore yesterday from London. Captain Mortensen changed his course and ran down within a few hundred feet of the object, when he saw the wreck of a wooden vessel, which had apparently been set on fire. The stem was awash and the frames sticking up made the illusion of people in an open boat. About eighty feet of the derelict were visible when the Rauma was alongside.

A Military Smoker.

Norfolk Light Artillery Blues will give a smoker Friday evening at 9 o'clock, at which the field and staff officers of the Fourth Virginia Regiment and also the line officers of Companies A, B and E, of the same regiment, residents of Norfolk, will be honored guests. The smokers of the Blues are always delightful affairs and that of Saturday night will be no exception.

NEW STEAMBOAT LINE

To Ply Between Norfolk, Cuba and the Bermudas.

A Representative of the Antilles Transportation Company Perfecting Arrangements to Establish an Office Here-What Norfolk Would Gain.

A representative of the Antilles Transportation Company, of New York, is in Norfolk perfecting arrangements for the establishment of an agency of his line in this city. This company is now running a regular line of steamers from New York to Cuba, Porto Rico and the Bermudas, and has recently leased the large piers of Mr. J. G. Christy, in Jacksonville, Fla., and the Whaley pier, in Savannah, with a view to greatly enlarge its facilities and operations.

It is hoped and believed that the Antilles Transportation Company will experience little or no trouble in our city in procuring a place adapted to the transaction of such business as it desires. We have a great amount of water front, and our people are sufficiently liberal and progressive to extend a helping hand to all who come with the intention of engaging in business here.

It is conceded by those with whom the representative of the Virginian-Pilot has talked on the subject that increased business connection with Cuba, Porto Rico and the Bermudas is most desirable. Hence the establishment of an agency here of the Antilles Transportation Company means another long stride in the march of progress.

For the steamers to touch here would mean that we would have direct communication with these islands, heretofore comparatively unknown to this port, and that a goodly share of the finest of fruits and tobaccos, together with sugar, log wood and bony, would come straight to our doors. It would also mean that we could dispose of a vast amount of the coal and lumber which is mined and produced in our adjacent territory and brought here for market.

We are informed that a vessel of the Antilles line would have already reached here had it not been for the fact that the company's steamer Kanawha was lost about thirty days ago with a cargo of bananas bound for New York. Arrangements have already been perfected to put a vessel in her place, and within thirty days the company expect to have a regular weekly service from New York, touching at Norfolk, Charleston, Jacksonville, Havana and Ponce. The Antilles Company is essentially a freight line, although accommodations have been made for first and second-class passengers. The general offices are at No. 11 Broadway, New York City.

Paddock, of Selma, Ala., winner of the 2:15 pace on the first day of the races, will be in this race also, and may give Democracy a great fight for first place.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.

MR. J. FRANK EAST PAINFULLY INJURED.

About 6:45 a. m. yesterday Mr. J. Frank East was painfully injured in a runaway accident at the corner of Highland and Kelly avenues, Brambleton Ward.
