The State Board of Agriculture Selects Officers.

The Salaries Carried by the Appointments—Marriage at Jonesboro—St. Mary's School Graduates—The State Guard Will Camp at Morehead—Officers Elected by State Medical Society.

Raleigh, N. C., June 2.—The Democratic members of the State Board of Agriculture met in caucus at the Yarrowborough House last night and selected officers which were to-day confirmed by the full board. They are as follows:

Assistant Commissioner of Agriculture—John W. Thompson. State Chemist—B. W. Kilgore. Assistants to State Chemist—Wm. Allen of Wadesboro; C. B. Williams, of Elizabeth City; S. E. Ashbury, of Gastonia; Grimes Haywood, of Raleigh; Fred. C. Lam, Elizabeth City.

Clerk in Chemical Department—J. P. Arrington, Nashville. Registering Clerk in Agricultural Department—W. A. Graham, Jr., Macleah.

Stenographer—Miss Mamie Birdsong, of Raleigh. Typewriter—Miss Lucy Reeves, of Rocky Mount.

Curator for Museum—H. H. Erimley, of Raleigh. Usher in Museum—Miss Annie Lewis, of Rocky Mount. Salary, \$10 a month.

Watchman—Thomas C. Cherry, of Edgemond. Salary, \$50 a month. Janitors—Gaston Broughton, of Wake, and J. P. Kennedy, of Wayne. Engineer—C. C. Lee, of Wake.

The fertilizer inspectors were selected by districts, as follows: First—J. C. Davis, of Martin, and H. T. King, of Pitt.

Commissioner Patterson's salary was reduced from \$1,800 to \$1,650. Secretary Bruner's salary was left at \$1,500.

The salary of the Immigration Commissioner was fixed at \$1,250. Salaries of all clerks were reduced from \$1,000 to \$900.

The positions of regular inspectors of fertilizers—two inspectors at salaries of \$1,200 and \$1,000—were abolished and fifteen special inspectors elected, to be employed only when needed, at a salary of \$75 a month.

MARRIAGE AT JONESBORO. On yesterday the residence of Dr. J. A. Ballentine, of Jonesboro, was the scene of a pretty home wedding.

The happy couple left on the first train for their new home, at Rouge Mount, in Durham county. Mr. Pool is a rising young minister in the Baptist denomination and the bride is the accomplished sister of Jonesboro's popular dentist.


