COUNCIL MAKES APPROPRIATION

\$10,000 to Keep Yellow Fever Out of Norfolk.

TWO SALARIES RAISED

An Increase of \$500 For City Attorney and \$200 For Inspector of Buildings—Telephone Franchise Extended—The Anti-Spitting Law Up Once More—A Bond Issue.

The Common Council held an important session last night. There were present President East and Messrs. Callahan, Stahl, Smith, Taylor, Whitehurst, Camp, Beam, Cake, Martin, McFarland, Kiernan and Hannan.

The anti-spitting ordinance came up again. Mr. East made a speech in favor of the ordinance, and moved to again send it to the Select Council. He hoped that the members of that body would wake from their Rip Van Winkle trance and not send the ordinance back for a third time.

Mr. Camp moved a conference committee be appointed to reach an agreement as to the ordinance, which motion prevailed.

SALARIES INCREASED. The Finance Committee presented an ordinance increasing the salary of City Attorney from \$2,000 to \$2,500 per year. A letter from Mr. Walter H. Taylor, the incumbent, was read, in which he explained that the duties and responsibilities of the office have been rapidly and constantly increasing until it has now become one of the important departments of the municipal government. The ordinance was passed.

The Finance Committee favorably reported an ordinance increasing the salary of the Inspector of Buildings to \$1,200 per annum. The ordinance was passed.

An ordinance appropriating \$700 in addition to the \$60,000 already appropriated for the opening of Tripoli and Wolf streets was passed.

An ordinance providing for the issuance of \$175,000 in bonds to meet street appropriations was passed. The interest on said bonds are to be not more than 5 per cent.

TO GUARD OFF THE FEVER. An ordinance, presented by the Finance Committee, appropriating \$10,000 to meet expenses incurred in keeping yellow fever out of Norfolk, was adopted.

The report of the Almshouse Committee on the proposals for supplies for the City Almshouse, was read and approved.

Mr. Camp offered a resolution providing that no bond on any building contract be approved until a certificate showing his license tax has been paid. The resolution was adopted.

The Street Committee recommended that the Duke street be paved with asphalt from Freemason street to College Place. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee, as the resolution carried an appropriation of \$999.19 to meet the expenses of the improvement.

TELEPHONE FRANCHISE. The report of the special telephone committee on the application of the Southern States Telephone Company for an extension of its franchise for thirty years was received. The ordinance granting the franchise was favorably recommended by the committee, as amended. One amendment provided for the extension of the franchise twenty-five years instead of thirty. Another provided that the company should forfeit all privileges contained in the franchise in the event it sold its stock to another company.

Mr. East opposed the extension of the franchise to the citizens of the country, he said, made gross mistakes when they gave away valuable franchises without any consideration. He said the clause as to the transferring of the privileges was not worth the paper it was written on. He was afraid the city was placing itself in the power of this telephone company.

Messrs. Taylor and Camp made brief speeches favoring the extension of the franchise.

Mr. East had to leave just before the vote was taken, and as a parting shot he said: "Gentlemen, you will be held accountable to the people in passing this ordinance. You know what I told you about the honor license cut."

Mr. East was not present at the vote the ordinance was unanimously passed.

The deed of certain property for the opening of a new street from J. T. Bolton was received.

An ordinance designating the new street as Canal street was adopted.

WASTE PAPER BOX PROVISION. A letter was read from the Street, Sewer and Drain Board, requesting that the proposition of an Atlanta firm petitioning for the privilege of placing waste paper boxes containing advertising on the street, be referred to that board for action, was read. After some discussion the matter was referred to the Street, Sewer and Drain Board, with instructions to that board to report on the matter to Councils.

propriation of \$1,250 to purchase street sweepers and carts, was read and the request granted, with the understanding that the money was to be paid out of the \$10,000 already appropriated for barring out the fever.

The ordinance of the Sanitary Commission prohibiting cess pools was passed with amendments.

Letters were read from the Board of Water Commissioners and Dr. J. Jett McCormick, secretary of the Board of Health, urging the creation of the office of bacteriologist. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee.

A resolution was passed requiring the suspension of work on the saw mill erected on the Granby street canal by F. W. McCullough, no permission from Councils having been obtained to erect it.

Mr. Camp presented a resolution providing that Norfolk become a member of the League of American Municipalities. The dues, Mr. Camp explained, were \$10 a year. The resolution was passed.

BAPTIST CONFERENCE. MEETING OF LOWER DISTRICT UNION OF PORTSMOUTH ASSOCIATION.

The Lower District Union of the Portsmouth Association, which has been in session since July 25th, closed Sunday after the morning session. The union was called to order by Mr. A. B. Walker, Moderator, and T. C. Whitehurst was made secretary.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. T. C. Whitehurst, after which the union transacted routine business.

The moderator appointed the various committees.

The discussion of the first topic on the program, "A Christian," by Rev. Samuel Saunders and other delegates. The meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION. Devotional exercises conducted by A. B. Walker, appointed on time, place and preacher by Rev. S. Saunders, Rev. T. C. Whitehurst and Mr. Ansell.

The second topic was taken up: "The Church Discipline—Cultural and Correlational." It was ably discussed by Rev. Samuel Saunders and other delegates, after which the meeting adjourned to meet at 8 p. m. to hear the introductory sermon.

NIGHT SESSION. Introductory sermon by Rev. J. W. Mitchell, from Rom. 13-11, which was received with great favor.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION. Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. L. C. Brickhouse.

The third topic was taken up: "Individual Christian Duty Toward the Liquor Traffic." Discussed by Revs. Saunders and Brickhouse, after which the meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION. After devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. E. B. Morris, the topic was thrown open for discussion, after which the reports of conference were heard.

Committee on time, place and preacher submitted their report. Time of next meeting Friday before 11th Sunday in October; place Centreville.

Committee on Devotional Exercises reported as follows: Preacher on Saturday night, Rev. T. C. Whitehurst; Sunday morning, 10:30, Sunday school mass meeting, address by Revs. L. C. Brickhouse, T. C. Whitehurst and Mr. A. B. Walker. Preaching at 11:30 by Rev. E. B. Morris. After sermon ordination of deacons by Rev. T. C. Whitehurst, house, charge to deacons by Rev. T. C. Whitehurst, charge to church, Rev. E. B. Morris. The above being adopted, the session closing after the morning sermon, Rev. T. C. Whitehurst remaining to conduct special meeting this week at the body was entertained admirably by the people of Knott's Island.

A SAMPLE STORY. HOW RECKLESS TALKERS MISREPRESENT THINGS. Yesterday's Richmond Dispatch says: "Mr. Clarence A. Pickett, formerly of this city, but recently of Norfolk, where he was a printer on the Virginia-Pilot, came to Manchester yesterday, and had a hard time getting out of Norfolk because of the quarantine against yellow fever districts. The regulations of the Board of Health of Norfolk seemed to apply to the persons who wish to leave the city, and Mr. Pickett said every day he was asked, 'How did you get to the Norfolk and Western train at Richmond, and had to dodge the policemen at every point.'"

"Quite a number of Manchester people who had been caught at Old Point Neck, on the Chesapeake and Ohio train last night. One lady who, with several children, came to the train and thought a few hours before the train left that she would not see Manchester again for the next time. She found out later that to be more comfortable and save no time in packing up and catching one of them."

"This is a fair sample of reports that will presumably obtain circulation at the expense of Norfolk. In the first place Mr. Pickett has not been a printer on the Virginia-Pilot, there is no such name on the Typographical Union rolls and if he experienced any difficulty in getting out of Norfolk it was all his own fault. The people who desired to interview him were not the slightest bit interested in the matter, and those who did leave the city did not find it necessary to dodge policemen for that cause."

Atlantic City should be connected with the sewers within ten days.

The board adjourned until this morning.

SPECIAL SANITARY OFFICERS. Mayor Johnston yesterday swore in the following physicians as special sanitary officers, with police authority: Drs. R. Kiffin, Lomas, Washney, Jerrard Brown, Charles R. Grandy, E. V. Baxter, J. R. Speight, L. Lanford, J. A. Robinson, W. J. Adams, H. T. Hunter, Southgate Leigh, S. A. Sutton, P. S. J. Moncreux, L. R. Chiles, L. C. Slingerher.

TRANSPORTATION MEN MEET. The Transportation Association of Norfolk met again yesterday and adopted the following resolution: "Resolved, That the members of this association pledge themselves as far as in their power to carry out any instructions that may be issued by the health authorities to cooperate with them in any way possible."

It was decided that passengers coming from points where refugees from the infected district might have gone to Norfolk should be rigidly inspected.

REMOVAL OF VETERANS SUGGESTED. The association also sent this dispatch to Governor Tyler: "Hon. J. Hoge Tyler, Richmond, Va.: 'At a meeting of the Transportation Association of the city of Norfolk, at noon, it was represented by Mayor Johnston that request had been made upon the national government to remove the National Soldiers' Home, near Hampton by transports to some remote point in the north all inmates of the home not infected. It was also represented that the government contemplated removing from Norfolk the National Soldiers' Home, near Hampton, and station there. Mr. Johnston has urged that sufficient number of troops be left at Old Point to fully protect quarantine. The action of Mr. Johnston was fully endorsed by the meeting of our association, and we are ably requested to use your best offices in inducing the officials of the War Department to carry out the suggestion of Mayor Johnston.'"

DOCTORS MEET AGAIN. The Norfolk Medical Association also held another meeting yesterday, and requested Governor Tyler to lend the quarantine authorities the State police boats Chesapeake and Accomac and the Naval Reserve's practice boat Siren.

The police department was requested to give all city physicians police authority.

Chairman Nimmo, of the County Board of Supervisors, reported the appointment of five special officers for the patrol of the shores of Tanner's Creek district.

STRANGERS EXAMINED. The police yesterday took in charge a number of strangers who were required to give an account of themselves at the detention station near the cemetery. Nearly all of them gave satisfactory assurances that they were not from the quarantined district, and were allowed to go. The police are very active. As soon as a suspect is arrested he or she is turned over to the quarantine authorities.

CRANEY ISLAND TURNED OVER. Mayor Johnston Monday evening invited Surgeon General Wyman, of the Marine Hospital Service, asking that Craney Island be turned over to the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth immediately as a quarantine station, and yesterday received the following reply: "Authorized to occupy at once Craney Island, under the supervision of Passed Assistant Surgeon W. H. Smith, who will return to Norfolk to-morrow."

It will be recalled that on June 25, of the present year, Mayor Johnston suggested the procurement of this island for such emergencies as the present, and set to work to acquire it, which yesterday culminated in securing this valuable property. It may be not be needed, but should the occasion arise it will prove an exceptionally fine quarantine station.

COULD NOT LAND. Yesterday afternoon colored fishermen residing in Brambleton solicited permission to come up to a wharf on land, but as he came from the quarantined district, he was sent word that if he attempted to make a landing he must take the consequences.

HEALTH CERTIFICATES IMPORTANT. Assistant Quarantine Officer Lynch, of Norfolk, issued the following yesterday: "Owing to the quarantine regulations enforced at various points against certain other points in the State, it is deemed advisable to suggest to the traveling public the use of health certificates, curing health certificates, endorsed by the Mayor or Health Officer of their respective towns or cities. Such certificates should show that the holder named is a citizen of the town or city named, and has not been in the quarantined territory or other points in ten days. These certificates can be endorsed by mayors, health officers or ticket agents of towns visited from day to day, and will, if properly issued and certified to from day to day, save considerable anxiety and delays from inspecting officers, and greatly expedite in the work of inspection. Special notices of quarantine restrictions will be issued from time to time."

TRAINS DISCONTINUED. There will be no trains over the Chesapeake and Ohio railway to or from Norfolk for the next five days. All freight, passengers and general traffic, including the United States mail for the West via the Chesapeake and Ohio railway will be forwarded to Richmond and transferred to the Chesapeake and Ohio to be carried by their docks and Ohio road will continue for five days, unless the fever situation grows worse. In that case there is no telling when the road will resume operations.

A SUGGESTION. Mayor Johnston yesterday called Governor Tyler and by long distance telephone and asked him to use his influence with the Secretary of War, who has charge of the Soldiers' Home, to secure an order for the removal of all veterans in good health, or free from danger of contracting yellow fever, to the north, where they would enjoy absolute immunity. The Governor thought the suggestion timely and promised to communicate with the Secretary at once.

SITUATION AT HAMPTON. As to the situation at the Home, Governor Woodfin said last night it was much better, and more promising. No new cases had developed since Monday

night. There has been one death within the past twenty-four hours, making a total of thirty-eight cases in all, and in the hospital there are now thirty patients.

THE VETS NOT ALARMED. Governor Woodfin said that there was not the least bit of alarm among the old soldiers at the Home. He said they actually refused to believe that it was yellow fever, and were less concerned about it than the people elsewhere.

Dr. E. E. Peill, acting assistant surgeon in charge of the Marine Hospital Corps in Norfolk, was seen last night, after a conversation with telephone with Surgeon Eugene Washin, in charge at Hampton. Dr. Washin stated that three new cases at the Home and one death there was the total for yesterday. One case had been discovered just outside the Home that was already convalescent. A case that was considered suspicious, but had not been diagnosed as yellow fever, had been found at Phoebus. A house to house inspection is being made in Phoebus by Surgeons Washin, White, Pettus and Passed Assistant Surgeon Wertenbaker.

Hospital Steward Kolb has been ordered from Norfolk to the Home in connection with the fever work.

There has been thus far thirty-eight cases and eight deaths to date at the Home.

NEWPORT NEWS PROTESTS. Newport News health officials, and in fact, all the Newport News authorities are protesting against the Norfolk and Portsmouth quarantine against the city. The embodiment of this protest came to the health authorities here yesterday in the form of a letter from Dr. Hobson, Quarantine officer at Newport News. The letter stated that the Norfolk quarantine as it affected Newport News, was unreasonable, since the latter city is protected against the fever by three divisions of guards—one at the Soldiers' Home, another at Hampton, and still another at Newport News. The letter was practically a demand that the quarantine against Newport News be raised, but the State Quarantine and Health Boards will not entertain such proposition until it is shown beyond all doubt that the disease is safely penned up in the Hampton Soldiers' Home hospital. According to the expressions of various authorities, it is probable that within one or two days, if the situation is improved, the absolute quarantine will be so modified as to admit of limited traffic communication between the two cities. At present, if the quarantine were raised, the officials fear it might cause other cities to quarantine against this city. This would certainly be the citizens' plan, and any vestige of the disease should appear at Newport News and if there had been a lax quarantine maintained by Norfolk.

An Important Notice. Mr. J. D. Hoffelmer, president of the Street, Sewer and Drain Board, gives notice in another column that hereafter until further notice, all garbage will be collected daily throughout the city. He requests that the citizens place their refuse in proper receptacles, and put them out as early as possible, not forgetting to separate the ashes from the garbage.
