SHAMROCK READY FOR ANOTHER RACE

The Challenger Will Make Another Effort to Defeat the Cup Defender.

(By Telegraph to Virginian-Pilot.) New York, Oct. 18.—The new topmast for the Shamrock, made necessary by the accident of Tuesday, was put in place to-day, the torn club topsail repaired and everything is now in readiness for a race to-morrow. Extra ballast was put on board the yacht during the night and a new measurement made of her this morning. This showed the vessel's present water line to be 88.95 feet and her racing length by club rule 102.565 feet. The Shamrock will now allow Columbia sixteen seconds on a thirty mile course. To-morrow's race will be fifteen miles to windward or leeward and back, the start to be made at 11 o'clock as usual. Half an hour before sunset the Shamrock lay inside Sandy Hook gently tugging at her mooring buoy. It had been the purpose of the visitors to go outside with the Shamrock and test her

new equipment, but though she came down the harbor from her re-measurement early this forenoon, the shortening daylight afforded too little time after all had been snugged. The Columbia's men had a day of comparative rest, though the men made the usual examination of the ship this morning and later scrubbed the yacht's sides. Sir Thomas Lipton is delighted with the evidences of good will that have come to him and he says he has proven what he believed to be true, that no man ever met more cordial greeting than he had here. No man ever met more generous hearts, more willing hands or more honest men than he since he came to America. He said he is seriously embarrassed by the illness of his designer, Mr. Plfe, and even now he did not know whether Shamrock sailed in these waters on her true water line.

A Cycle Record Clipped. Birmingham, Ala., October 18.—At the second night's meet of the National Cyclist Association races, Joe Biddle, of this city, clipped three seconds off the Southern record for a mile, crossing the tape in 1:43 1-5. Nelson, of Chicago, came on later and lowered the one-fifth of a second. The one mile open professional, unpaired was won by Jay Eaton, Time—2:19. A ten mile motor-paced match between Charles W. Miller and Frank Waller was won by Miller in 19:17.

A Wonderful Performance. New York, October 18.—Mrs. Jane Lindsey finished her 800-mile bicycle ride at 4:15 a. m. today, having completed the task in ninety-one hours, forty-eight minutes, the best time for the distance that a woman has ever done. Last month Miss Yattman rode 700 miles in eighty-one hours, five minutes. Mrs. Lindsey did the same distance in seventy-eight hours, fifteen minutes. Mrs. Lindsey slept six hours within the period of her ride.

THE JUBILEE CONVENTION.

GRATIFYING PROGRESS IN MISSIONARY WORK.

(By Telegraph to Virginian-Pilot.) Cincinnati, October 18.—The Jubilee Missionary Convention of the Christian Church, which began last Thursday, reached their climax today, when the American Christian Missionary Society continued its sessions in sections. There are over 12,000 visitors. Music Hall, with a seating capacity of over 5,500, is unable to accommodate the audiences, and other halls and churches are used for the overflow meetings. The Odeon Hall was used for the business session, with Dr. W. F. Richardson presiding. Reports were heard from all of the committees on different branches of the work. At the main meeting in Music Hall Dr. A. G. Thomas conducted the opening exercises, with C. E. Millard as leader of the singing. The annual address of President W. F. Richardson was on "Our Jubilee and Our Plea." The addresses of F. D. Power on "Our Cities for Christ," and of A. M. Wargard on "State Missions to the Front," were followed by general discussions. In celebrating the hour of thanksgiving for reaching the hundred thousand dollar mark the past year for home missions, C. B. Newman made the leading address. Corresponding Secretary Benjamin L. Smith read his annual report, from which the following is taken: "During the past half century \$2,300,000 have been raised and expended for missions, resulting in the organization of 2,361 churches by missionary work and the reception of 95,560 persons into the Church by missionary agents. There are forty-six State organizations, auxiliary to the general society, and these report 255,158 additions to the Church under their direction. The report shows that the last year

was the most prosperous of all. Two new missionary churches have been organized every week and 6,046 persons have been received into the various missionary churches. The board is maintaining missions in thirty-six different States, and have entered upon the work of city evangelization in forty-six cities.

The Christian Church, the report said, enjoys the distinction of being the first Protestant church to enter the island of Porto Rico. J. A. Erwin went there in November, 1898, and is carrying on a successful mission in San Juan. The work has been greatly enlarged and the list of missionaries maintained is a formidable one. Five gifts of \$5,000 each were given during the last year as endowments of missions, the Home Board agreeing in the name of these funds to maintain a home missionary during all the years.

The society is out of debt and looks to the future with great promise of success. The fields of Mexico, Canada and the foreign populations are all asking attention and will doubtless receive it. The report recommended an evangelistic movement throughout the church to close the century and plans for a thousand missionary revival meetings to be held throughout the country during 1900.
