New York, Nov. 15.-The cotton market made fair progress in an upward direction this morning, but most of the session there was a feeling of nervousness, apparent in the plt, gencrated by persistent circulation of conflicting rumors as to the feeling abroad. Shorts were made extremely uneasy by an estimate on a crop of 8,700,000 beles, following, as it did, last night's estimate of 9,000,000 bales, by the Government. An effort to cover, together with active buying for Wall Street ac-

count, sent prices up 4 to 3 points on the opening call, and gave the market a steady tone. The trading level immediately following the opening was 9 to 12 points above the close of last night, but later profit-taking caused a substantial reaction. Liverpool responded to our advance of yesterday to the satisfaction of holders here, but lost a good chare of the improvement before the market opened under heavy realizing and bear hammering. Receipts, not only in the interior, but at the ports as well, fell short of the amount predicted early in the week. Dispatches reported an advance of 1-16@%c. in Southern spot market.
