**BRAMBLETON WARD**  
Seventy-five Thousand Dollars Voted for Street Improvements.  
Important Action of the Local Board of Improvement Last Night—Applications for Positions—The Chesapeake Transit Company.

The Brambleton Local Board met in November session last night, President Jones presiding.

Mr. Reed, chairman of the Street Committee, reported the streets in a much improved condition, several of the prominent avenues having recently been resurfaced.

Street Inspector Putnam reported that he was making a side-walk on Corpeau avenue, near Shoalhouse No. 2, and that 618 loads of shells had been used on Brambleton, Park, Willoughby, Windsor, Lovitt, Highland and Gibbs avenues; that 70 loads of clinders had been placed on the side-walks on Gibbs, Jameson, Reservoir, Claiborne, Maltby, Cooke, Willoughby and Kelley avenues, and 24 loads of dirt on Carr street. Both reports were received and filed.

**REPORT ON FINANCE.**  
The Finance Committee offered the following, which was adopted:

The committee, after consideration of the matter of additional policemen for the ward, would recommend that if the board should decide to increase the police force it limit the additional expenditure to \$720 per annum.

**CHESAPEAKE TRANSIT COMPANY.**  
Mr. Cole, vice-president of the Chesapeake Transit Company, was allowed the privileges of the floor. He said he desired to correct a grave misconception in the minds of some citizens in regard to the purposes of the company, many being of the impression that it was its purpose to run freight cars through the city limits, all of which he said was entirely erroneous. It was the sole object of the road to run only electric passenger cars through the city.

**WANT POSITIONS.**  
Applications for positions on the police force in the event of an increase were received from the following: S. S. Spencer, E. C. Hampshire, E. B. Moore, S. B. Pope, Charles Powers, George Bell and E. W. Crocker. They were received and filed.

Several petitions for positions on the fire department and street-working gang took the same course.

**PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.**  
A petition from residents and property owners on Reservoir avenue for an electric light on the corner of Bond street and Reservoir avenue was referred to the Committee on Lights.

A communication from Mr. Robert Dayton, asking the board to remove two trees from the front of 623 Brambleton avenue, was referred to the Street Committee with power to act.

A communication from the City Engineer, asking for certain supplies to complete the electrical pumping plant for the Ward's Sewerage System, was approved and the City Engineer empowered to purchase at a cost of \$557.

A petition of Mr. W. P. Ford, to erect a 6-horsepower boiler to be used for sawing wood on the west side of the Norfolk and Western Railroad, near the intersection of Highland avenue, with a one-story frame structure, was granted.

**PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT**  
The Finance Committee reported the finances of the Ward in a condition to justify the issue of \$75,000 worth of bonds for permanent street improvements, and offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the City Attorney be requested to draw a petition, in proper legal form, asking the State Legislature for authority to be given the Councils of the City of Norfolk to issue bonds to the amount of \$75,000 for permanent improvements in Brambleton Ward.

Second, That the said petition be first submitted to the Finance Committee and the Honorable Councils of the City.

the City of Norfolk for their approval and endorsement.

Third, That the chairman of the Board appoint a committee, of which he shall be ex-officio chairman, to appear before the Finance Committee and Honorable Councils of the City of Norfolk, and also before the State Legislature, to urge the granting of said petition.

City Attorney Taylor presented an act which he had drawn up to be presented to the Legislature and Councils, covering all the points in the above resolution, which the Board approved.

The Act is to authorize the City Councils of Norfolk to issue bonds from time to time, not exceeding \$75,000 of principal, predicted upon the assessed value of the property of Brambleton Ward.

Mr. Ferbee, from the Sewer Committee, stated that the gravity section of the Ward was ready for house connections.

The matter of electric lights in the ward was introduced by Mr. Ferbee, in which he referred to the action of the Atlantic City Board.

It was learned from the secretary that he had communicated with the Light Committee of the Councils stating that the board would unite with the city in a contract for lighting the ward with electricity next year. The board endorsed the action of the secretary.

All properly approved bills were allowed.

**NEW SYNAGOGUE LOT**  
Ruined by Tripoli Street Extension, Says Chief Sholem Trustees.

Cutting Off Strip Renders It Inconvenient to Build Synagogue Which Will Face Congregation to the Eastward as is the Custom.

The trustees of the Chief Sholem Temple want a re-appraisal of their property on Freeman street, which was among that condemned for the extension of Tripoli street. They claim that the award of the condemnation commissioners was too low and ask Judge Hanchel, of the Corporation Court, to appoint a new commission. The matter was argued before him yesterday and he has it under advisement.

Not only do the Chief Sholem trustees claim the award of \$100 per front foot for the 16½ feet of their property condemned was too low simply from the standpoint of the worth of the real estate, but they claim that the cutting off of this much from their 160 foot lot will interfere with their plans to build a Jewish Synagogue thereon, and that the whole property is thus depreciated in value, in that it will not answer for the purposes for which the trustees bought it. They claim this fact should be taken into consideration in making the award for the strip that has been condemned.

In the hearing yesterday a number of witnesses were introduced on both sides. Mr. I. Moritz, president of the Chief Sholem congregation, was among these. Mr. Moritz explained that it was the invariable custom to build Jewish temples of worship so that the congregation would face the east. The 100-foot lot on Freeman street was purchased at the cost of \$8,500 and it was considered the only suitable and convenient location which the trustees had. The cutting off of 16½ feet off of this lot, it was claimed, made it too small for the purposes intended and rendered it inconvenient to build a synagogue thereon after the plan which must be followed—that of facing the congregation to the eastward.

Several real estate owners were introduced as witnesses. They estimated that \$125 per front foot for the property was a reasonable price. The condemnation commissioners awarded \$100 per front foot, or \$1,650 for that portion of the lot condemned. While the property only cost \$55 per front foot about three years ago, it is claimed that it was bought for an extremely low price. It is a part of the old Tunis property.

City Attorney Walter H. Taylor, who represented the city, argued that the award of the commissioners was sufficient, and claimed that the 8½ feet left was sufficient to erect a house of worship as large as Epworth Church, or St. Luke's.

Mr. James F. Duncan is counsel for the Chief Sholem trustees.

**LAST OF HER NAME.**  
THE FUNERAL AND INTERMENT OF MISS LIVINGSTON.

The funeral of Miss Herbert T. Livingston, whose remains reached here yesterday morning over the Cape Charles route from New York, where she died last Friday, took place at Elmwood Cemetery, Rev. Robert Gatewood, of St. Paul's P. E. Church, Berkeley, conducting the services. Following were the pall-bearers: Captain W. W. Old, Messrs. Charles Sharp, Thurman Hoggar, Jr., Thomas Talbot, A. T. Herbert, W. Minton Talbot.

Miss Livingston was born in Hertfordshire, now Berkley, in 1890, and was the daughter of Captain John Livingston, who married a Miss Herbert one of the well known Herbert family who were the original patenters of all the land lying in the rear of Berkley. She was the last of the name in Virginia, and was a descendant of one of the seven brothers, who migrated to this country from Scotland before the revolution. Formerly she resided with her brother-in-law at Kempville, Princess Anne county, but has latterly made her home in New York.

The Herberts were scions of the house of Lord Pembroke. Her sister, Anne, married Anthony Walke, son of Rev. Anthony Walke, of the Episcopal Church, in his native country. Their home was the magnificent manor-estate of the Walke, near Kempville, which originally extended to Lynnhaven Bay. Another sister, known for her surpassing beauty and every other personal charm, became the wife of Dr. John Ingram, who was known and admired throughout Virginia for his gentlemanly qualities and culture. He was the father of Mrs. Boshier and of her sister Susan, both prominent in Norfolk society for a series of years. Miss Livingston was the type of all that is best and most gracious in a Virginia home.

**THE CATHOLIC MISSION.**  
INTERESTING REPORT SUBMITTED BY FATHER WILSON.

On last Sunday, Rev. Father T. J. Wilson, pastor of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church, gave a very pleasing and satisfactory report of the fifteen days' mission, recently given in his church, by Fathers Gillespie and Gleason of the Society of Jesus. This mission closed Sunday, the 19th instant. Father Wilson most sincerely thanked God for the result of the mission and cordially congratulated not only his own parishioners, but also all those who, at a sacrifice, availed themselves of that extraordinary opportunity of reconciling themselves with God, their neighbors and their own sin-laden conscience.

He warmly encouraged them to persevere in their piety of life, and to remember those memorable words of our Divine Lord, "He that persevereth to the end shall be saved," and again those other words, spoken to the Apostolic Band, "I have chosen you and appointed you, that you should go forth, and that you should bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain."

Father Wilson said there were many honest inquirers into the claim of the Catholic Church, upon human belief during the mission. All these questions, said Father Wilson, "were clearly and satisfactorily answered," but as the Catholic Church is slow in receiving, either members of other religious bodies, or even those who have never been baptised, without a full course of preparation for admission to her membership, not one of those who inquired were baptised, but were referred to me by the missionaries priests for further enlightenment and preparation."

After referring to the mission and its result, Father Wilson preached an excellent sermon, taking for his subject, "The Forerunners of the World's Disolution."

"The expense of the mission was \$125," said Father Wilson, "and when I gave my check to Father Gillespie he would not accept it. He destroyed it and I made out another for \$100, which I finally persuaded him to accept. This money will go to the college where young men are studying for the priesthood, and not a cent goes to either of the priests who conducted the mission at my church."
